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PARIS (NC) - The experiments attempted by Communism in the Soviet Union have had all but disastrous effects; the Soviets have been forced to renounce methods which they had installed and to return to the old ways. Unfortunately, it has proved difficult to do away with customs which they had favored, and the evil of the old errors are punishing them deplorably.

These are the conclusions reached after profound study by the fifty-five members of the League for Human Rights, which met in Paris.

The Soviets have always preached sexual freedom, but the economic conditions from the so-called poverty of bourgeois marriage, declared Prof. René Savatier, of the University of Paris, have led to the attitude of Communism toward marriage. Nevertheless, he stated, the Soviet Code has preserved this "freedom" and devoted many chapters to it.

In reality, he declared, marriage was despoiled of its meaning when, according to the Code of 1918, marriage engendered neither the right of cohabitation nor the duty of fidelity. It required only a declaration before the civil state and a declaration to end at the wish of either party.
