Sepulchre Cemetery Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Charles J. Brunton, county chaplain American Legion.

October, 1935—First National Catholic Rural Life Conference and National Catechetical Congress in the east held in Rochester upon invitation of the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester. Large assemblage of the hierarchy, priest-economists, educators, federal department heads were present for the sessions of the two conventions. Program opened with Solemn Pontifical Mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral celebrated by Archbishop Mooney. Church's concern with temporal economic welfare of people was brought out in light of Papal Encyclicals during Rural Life meeting. Emphasis was placed on teaching of Christian Doctrine by speakers in Catechetical Congress.

October, 1935—Address by the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Siconolfi, Apostolic Delegate to the United States over nation wide hook-up heard in Rochester during sessions of National Catechetical Congress. The Apostolic Delegate urged a Continuity of Christian Doctrine in all parishes in the United States.

October, 1935—The Rev. Charles J. Brunton, pastor of St. Margaret Mary's Church named chaplain of Monroe County, Ancient Order of Hibernians.

October, 1935—Formal dedication and blessing of new parish recreation hall of St. Monica's parish by Archbishop Mooney took place.

October, 1935—Parishioners of St. Paul's Church in Honeoye Falls, and of St. Joseph's Church in Rm. held a roast beef supper in honor of the forty-fifth anniversary of the pastorate of the Rev. Martin J. Cloney.

November, 1935—Award of the Silver Beaver was given to Milton Schaefer, Scout Leader of St. Boniface Troop No. 200, in recognition of his outstanding contribution to boyhood.

St. Simon Zealot

St. Simon was a native of Cana in Galilee, where Christ had worked His first public miracle—changing water into wine at a wedding feast. He drank so deeply of the wine of enthusiasm for Jesus that he received the by-name "the Zealot." He always showed himself a faithful observer of the divine law and with undaunted courage fought the enemies of the cross; after preaching the gospel in Africa, especially in Egypt, he went to Persia, where, like his namesake Simon Peter, he suffered martyrdom by crucifixion in the region of Soan—All who love the good Lord must be zealous in spreading His house and the message of His redemption, and by voluntary reparation give Him solace and satisfaction.

November, 1935—The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles P. Shay, Pastor of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Rochester, was elected first vice-president at the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees, Catholic Summer School of America, held in New York.

December, 1935—A testimonial dinner was given at Corning in honor of Past District Deputy Cornelius J. Mullen, Elmira, 56th district, Knights of Columbus, by the members of the Corning, Elmira, Waverly and Bath Councils.

December, 1935—The Most Rev. George Weig, S.V.D., Vicar Apostolic of the Tsingtao Catholic Mission, Shantung, China, told of the hardships encountered in China on his visit to Rochester.

December, 1935—In an editorial, "O. Professor" the CATHOLIC COURIER vigorously and clearly answered the statement of a psychologist of the University of Rochester who, in a sermon said, "It is impossible for any scientist to be satisfied with the theory that life was created by God."

December, 1935—Funeral services were held for the Rev. Augustine F. Temmerman, pastor of St. Vincent de Paul's Church, Corning.
