## St. James the Less

St. JAMES was called "the Just," which indicates an extraordinary holiness. He lived as a Nazarete, i.e., as one consecrated to God, never drank wine or any other intoxicating drink, and never had his hair cut. He wore no shoes or sandals, no other garments but a mantle over a linen undergarment. He prayed so much and so long that his knees became hard like those of a camel, as Eusebius and St. Jerome report. He often prayed in the old Temple. He was a cousin of the Lord by blood, and the first bishop of Jerusalem. He was thrown from the pinnacle of the Temple and put to death by a blow from an enraged fuller in the year 61.—Prayer and penance are great means of self-sanctification and of winning other souls for God.
