May, 1936—The Rev. William P. Ryan, member of the faculty of St. Bernard's Seminary addressed 350 members of the Nocturnal Adoration Society at their annual Communion breakfast, May 17.

May, 1936—A Mass Meeting sponsored by all Catholic lay societies in Rochester and marking the anniversaries of the great Encyclicals of Pope Leo XIII and Pope Pius XI was held in Columbus Auditorium to advance study and application of principles in those famous social justice documents.

May, 1936—Funeral services were held for the Rev. Francis X. Kunz, fifty-eight, pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church.

May, 1936—Two hundred and fifty members of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and the Ladies Auxiliary of Monroe County celebrated the 100th anniversary of the order in America with a dinner, May 16.

May, 1936—Miss Arlene Oster, formerly of Holy Rosary parish, Rochester, was received into the Order of Discalced Carmelites at Wheeling, West Virginia. She is known as Sister Joan of the Cross.

May, 1936—Plans were being made at Elmira for the building of a new Catholic Chapel at the Elmira Reformatory.

May, 1936—Announcement was made that the following young men of the Rochester Diocese would be ordained to the priesthood on June 6: Rev. Gerard Louis Amann; Rev. William Darcy Bolger; Rev. May, 1936—Members of Col. William Gilbert Auxiliary, U. S. Spanish War Veterans, presented a flag to St. Theodore's School.

May, 1936—A solemn pontical Mass was celebrated in St. Patrick's Cathedral, May 22 in commemoration of the third anniversary of the death of the Most Rev. John Francis O'Hern, third bishop of the Rochester Catholic Diocese.

June, 1936—About 500 boys and girls comprising the Junior Traffic Patrol of Rochester parochial schools, received their awards.
