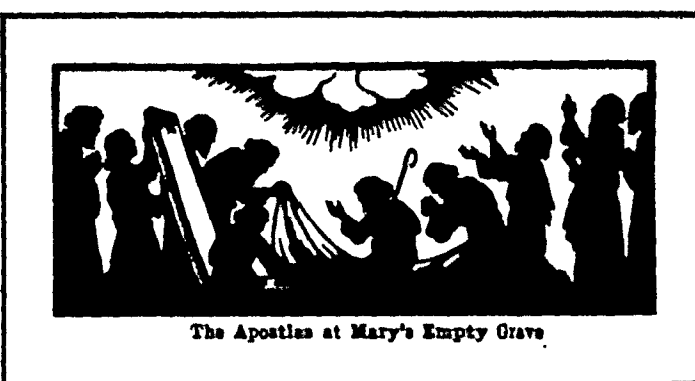

St. Bartholomew

ST. BARTHOLOMEW was the man with the simple and innocent heart, the Nathanael, who had been led to Jesus by Philip. When the apostles departed from Jerusalem, to preach the gospel to every creature, as the Lord had commanded them, St. Bartholomew chose the near-Orient and India. When St. Peter came to India, he found there many traces of the apostolic work of St. Bartholomew, and even a Hebrew copy of the Gospel of St. Matthew, brought there by the zealous apostle. From India he came back to Armenia, where, after he had achieved many conversions, he suffered martyrdom. — No greater service can be done to Christ than to win souls for His kingdom on earth and in heaven.

August, 1936—World War veterans of Auburn presented a pole and flag to the Columbian Squires at the Squire's camp on Owasco Lake.

August, 1936—Among the 157 children who attended the Religious Vacation School at Bath were four sets of twins and one set of triplets.

August, 1936—The Rev. Walter A. Poery, director of the Rochester Catholic Charities and pastor of Holy Rosary Church, returned home to Rochester after a two months visit to European countries.

August, 1936—At the Carmelite Monastery on East Avenue, Mary Josephine O'Brien of Boston was invested with the holy habit of Our Lady of Mount Carmel.

August, 1936—Programs were scheduled at Sacred Heart Academy and Corpus Christi Church to demonstrate the liturgical music taught at the Pius X School of Liturgical

Music summer school sessions held here.

August, 1936—The Rev. Alexander J. Stec sailed August 24 on the SS Pilsudski for Krakow, Poland, where he will take a course in the Polish language at Jagello University.

August, 1936—The famed St. Ann's Band from Pennsylvania arrived in Auburn and camped on the grounds of Enna Jettick Park.

August, 1936—Funeral services were held at the Mother House, Pittsford, for Sister Cornelia Mahan, of the Sisters of St. Joseph who died August 22.

August, 1936—The Society of the Divine Word began building the St. Michael's Mission House at Hemlock Lake, which will serve as a high school to those having vocations to the Society.

August, 1936—An appeal for the Mexican Seminary to be built in the United States was made in a letter from Archbishop Mooney to the clergy and laity of the Rochester Diocese.

September, 1936—Archbishop Mooney urged all in attendance at a Solemn High Mass at Corpus Christi Church to work to gain popular approval of the liturgical music of the Church.

September, 1936—"The Life of Jesus" was selected for discussion and study by the Adult Study Clubs of the Diocese of Rochester, during the fall session, according to the Rev. John M. Duffy, Diocesan Director, Confraternity of Christian Doctrine.

September, 1936—Edward J. Lintz, 52 Tacoma Street, a student at St. Bernard's Seminary, sailed September 15 for Freiburg, Switzerland, to complete his theological studies.

September, 1936—The Rt. Rev. Magr. John P. Schellhorn was named honorary chaplain and the Rev. Joseph H. Geffell, regimental chaplain of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John.

September, 1936—It was announced that the Rev. F. William Stauder would be deacon at the Solemn Benediction of the national convention of the Holy Name Societies, held in New York from Sept. 17 to 20.

September, 1936—Keep children free from radical ideas, urged the Rev. Edward M. Hetowski, professor of homiletics at St. Joseph's Seminary, Dunwoodie, in the opening address of the 32nd annual teachers' conference of the diocese held at Aquinas Institute.

September, 1936—Knights of St. John held a testimonial dinner in honor of General Frank H. Biel, K.H.S., newly elected Supreme President of the Knights of St. John and Mrs. Teresa Ganster, re-elected Supreme President of the Ladies Auxiliary, Knights of St. John.

September, 1936—The Holy Name Bowling League of Auburn, opened its season of twenty-eight weeks September 14 under the management of Bill Dempsey.

September, 1936—The Rev. Donald M. Cleary, chaplain at Cornell University was principal speaker at the Detroit Diocesan Convention of Integrated Catholic Action held September 13 in Detroit.

September, 1936—State President Charles T. Trutt was re-elected at the annual state meeting of the Catholic Central Verein held in Albany.
