

### Msgr. Ryan Hails Pope's Guild System Support

CLEVELAND—The industrial organization recommended by His Holiness Pope Pius XI would not only be infinitely better than the present system of individualism tempered by corporatism, but it would be immeasurably superior to the undesirable and impossible proposals of socialism, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John A. Ryan, Director of the Department of Social Action, National Catholic Welfare Conference, declared in an address delivered here this week.

Msgr. Ryan spoke on "Ethical and Political Aspects of Social Organization" at a Catholic Culture Institute, presented by the Cleveland Club of Western Reserve University and Case University with the cooperation of the Cleveland Diocesan Council of the National Council of Catholic Women.

I once heard a missionary say it was the most successful of all the things he had done. He said he had long as we listened to it, or were guilty of harboring it.

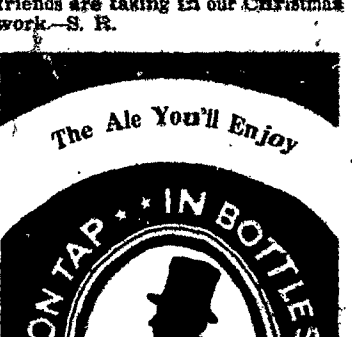
