RELIGION ONLY CRIME CURB, PRIEST AVERS

Study Reveals Lack of Moral Training Says Former Chaplain

Until children receive religious training and have instilled in them principles of morality anti-crime movements will make little progress, predicted the Rev. William F. Bergan, Chancellor of the Diocese, in an address at the Chamber of Commerce, Monday.

Speaking before the Council for Better Citizenship at a luncheon, Father Bergan, who for three and a half years was Chaplain at Auburn State Prison, said his observations showed that parents' failure to inculcate morality in the children had made the children irresponsible to every obligation.

In Auburn prison, the Chancellor declared, he found that 70% of the men were children of foreign born parents. Eighty per cent, he said, had not had any connection with the Church since infancy. About 12% attended church more or less frequently and only 6% were regular in church attendance.

Children today, he emphasized, are being brought up in a great many instances without any religious training. They will not go to church, they receive no religious instruction in the home and they cannot by law receive it in the schools.

To offset this condition he pointed out how by a present arrangement such instructions are now being given to a large number of the public school children outside of the school room.

None of this must be done, Father Bergan stated, until all the children receive religious training and moral guidance before the crime problem can hope to be solved.

He is survived by his widow Mrs. Anna Wegman, two sons Robert and James, a daughter, Cecilia, two sisters, Sister Johannes Marie of the Sisters of St. Joseph, and Mrs. Carrie Suss, and four brothers, Bernard, John, Frank and Anthony.
