

Father Cleary Urges Catholics To Prepare

Athens—Catholics as a whole are preparing for the lives of many Catholics has lost its meaning today, declared the Rev. Dennis M. Cleary, of Ithaca, formerly assistant pastor of Holy Family Church, when he spoke Thursday night at a banquet of the Catholic Action Society of St. Alphonsus Church, at the Imperial Lounge, which was

attended by nearly 100 persons. Father Cleary stressing the point that Catholics should be informed about their religion, cited the spirit of preparedness that is prevalent in every European nation, as they prepare for another war, cautioned his listeners to adopt the same degree towards the ever increasing opposition against the Catholic Church.

Need Modern Methods
"The men in power in Europe who are preparing their nations for war know they must be modern and are versed in ultra-modern warfare methods," he explained. "You and I who are fighting enemies of Catholicism must also adopt modern methods."

He spoke of his work among Auburn Prison inmates and youths in C.C.C. camps and also of his present association with college students in Ithaca.

He laid blame for indifference shown by members of these groups towards faith, as a lack of intelligent appreciation of values and related to the fact that religion has not been allowed to live outside the Church.

Father Cleary said that Catholicism can be attained through a study and understanding of Catholicism and that each individual must be filled with zeal. Mrs. Dorothy Macmillan, treasurer, introduced other speakers of the evening, the Rev. Francis G. Waterstrat and the Rev. Wallace Plummer, both of St. Alphonsus Church.

The two periods complemented the work on the work accomplished during the past year and presented the necessity of a new more enlightening program in the coming months.

Following the dinner, Ukrainian folk dances were given by four young, talented Ukrainians, the Misses Anna and Emma Sobolev and Stephen Goman and John Kyrzycki.
