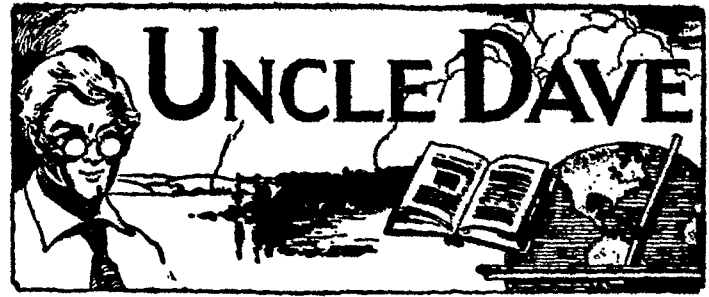


2 Fridays Per Week

NEW YORK. The invention of the Rev. Walter G. Summers, chief of the Department of Psychology at Fordham University as a recording psychogalvanometer popularly termed "lie detector" was used by officials investigating the killing of Mrs. Mary Robinson Case here.
