**Seneca Falls Launch First Parish  
Credit Union Here**

Holy Family Parish Credit Union, first organization of  
its kind in the diocese, held its first meeting last Monday  
evening in the school hall on Jay street.  
With 26 members in attendance, the credit union elected Wil-  
liam C. Schwab, Joseph Lehner, Charles  
J. Miller, Martha Schuyler and  
Frank A. Gross to be the directors  
until the first annual meeting of  
the members. William C. Schwab  
was elected president, Joseph Leh-  
ner, vice-president, Charles J.  
Miller, Treasurer, and Martha  
Schuyler, Secretary.

The formation of a credit union  
in Holy Family Parish was made  
possible by the encouragement and  
helpful guidance of Rev. Joseph H.  
Gottel, the pastor.

**Purpose of Unions**  
The establishment of credit  
unions is encouraged among Catho-  
lics in order to prevent undue  
hardship to parishioners because of  
their inability to secure in times of  
emergency the funds which are so  
valuable to them.

Payments on shares may be made  
at the rate of 25 cents a week, this  
making its service available to the  
parishioner of very small means.

The parish credit union is not  
yet open for business. It is in the  
process of being organized in the  
parish of St. Marie de C. Parish at  
Manchester, N. H. Today there are  
hundreds of such institutions  
throughout New England and the  
states of the middle West. One of  
the largest credit unions in the  
country is in the Catholic Parish  
of Central Park, N. Y.
