**Elmira Act
Of Dancer
Protested**

**Sally Rand Gives Less
Objectionable Performance
as Result.**

ELMIRA—A less objectionable performance was given by Sally Rand, dancer in Keeney Theater here Wednesday of last week as a result of a protest by the Rt. Rev. Magr. John J. Lee, V.F., dean of Elmira deanery, in the name of the Catholic clergy here.

That was the consensus of opinion of the Elmira priests. Police reports to City Manager Ralph P. Klebes to whom the protest was made that the performance did not violate the law.

Poster Objectionable

Objectionable posters advertising Sally Rand's (coupe) appearance at the Catholic church and cinema here and they requested the City Manager to ban the show.

Following a conference with the dancer in his office late Tuesday afternoon, Mr. Klebes said:

It has been requested by a number of persons that I stop the performance of Sally Rand and her troupe at the Keeney Theater. Legally I have no right to take this action until the law has been definitely violated.

It is a violation of the law that no person shall appear nude in any public street or building.

Knights Act

Attending the conference were Police Chief Elvin T. Weaver, Assistant Corporation Counsel George H. Winner, Al Beckerich, manager of the theater, and R. E. Crabbill of Jamestown, representative of Warner Brothers Theater Inc.

Elmira Council, Knights of Columbus met in Columbus Center Tuesday night to review the action of the Knights of Columbus in protesting to City Manager Klebes the public appearance of the dancer.

A resolution, which did not specifically mention Miss Rand's appearance was adopted by the council as follows:

"Resolved That Elmira Council 229 Knights of Columbus protest against all indecent or immoral exhibitions, entertainments and performances and that the officials of the City of Elmira be requested to enforce the laws respecting the same."

**PRIEST DUE HERE
IS SUSPENDED**

of this nature described him as a representative of the Irish people of Irish Catholicism, and of world humanitarianism.

As soon as this release was sent out the National Catholic Welfare Conference news service cabled a Dublin correspondent to determine Father O'Flanagan's ecclesiastical status.

An answer was received stating that the priest is suspended and that he left his diocese in Ireland without permission to come to the United States "about 1927" to speak in behalf of the Sinn Fein.

Elphin Bishop Acts

To confirm this first information, the National Catholic Welfare Conference news service cabled two more queries to other agencies in Dublin and answers confirmed the fact that Father O'Flanagan is a suspended priest.

When Father O'Flanagan in his first speeches in this country began denying he was under suspension, the N.C.W.C. news service cabled direct to diocesan authorities at Elphin, Ireland, and sent this reply:

"All diocesan faculties withdrawn from Father O'Flanagan April, 1925 by Bishop of Elphin. These faculties never since restored to him by bishop."

Father O'Flanagan claims that he was received by members of the hierarchy in this country in 1921 while speaking in behalf of the Sinn Fein movement.

Reporting a speech made in Boston by Father O'Flanagan on November 25, 1923, the Boston Globe quoted him as saying that he had been twice suspended as a priest "because of the speeches he had made in connection with Irish politics but as saying that he had been reinstated."

In December, 1921 he was reported in the press as being welcomed in Chicago by a member of the Hierarchy who said:

"Father O'Flanagan knows well that the honor is not intended for himself personally or even for his priestly character but he comes to us representing a cause for which he has labored and suffered."

Thus it would seem that Father O'Flanagan himself said that before November 1923 he had twice been suspended as a priest, according to newspaper reports.

DETROIT—The Rev. Michael O'Flanagan of Ireland who was to have lectured here last Monday evening on behalf of the Spanish Leftists, failed to appear. The Michigan Catholic of this city observes, "for some unknown reason." It was said at the meeting which Father O'Flanagan was to have addressed that he would speak in Detroit at a later date.

CLEVELAND—A young man in the audience who rose in his place to protest the introduction of the Rev. Michael O'Flanagan of Ireland as a Roman Catholic priest when the latter addressed a meeting held here under the auspices of the Friends of Spanish Democracy, was set upon by several men in nearby seats, beaten and ejected from the hall.

Increases**

**Chest Budget Calls For
\$181,888.48 for Our
Institutions**

With a \$1,150,000.00 budget calling for an appropriation of \$181,888.48 to ten Catholic institutions, the 1937 Community Chest drive is under way.

The drive will continue through Monday with the final report meeting scheduled for that evening.

The \$181,888.48 appropriation for the ten Catholic agencies represents an increase of more than \$10,000 over the 1936 appropriation of \$171,104.34.

The participating Catholic agencies and their appropriations for the coming year under the Community Chest budget are:

Price of Beer and Ale Advances 7%

The undersigned Rochester breweries, and practically all other breweries in New York State are forced to make a small increase in the price of their products. In view of the loyal support which has always been given us by the dealers and the public of Rochester and vicinity, we feel that the following brief explanation is in order:

Scarcity of Grains

This price advance comes with little surprise to the trade. Dealers have known for many weeks past of the continued increase in cost of materials. Soon after the drought of last summer the world-wide prices of cereal grains began to mount until today they are more than 50% higher than eight months ago. Other necessary materials used in production have also steadily increased in cost—almost everything except our good, old Hemlock water.

Increased Labor Costs

A recent agreement signed by Rochester brewers and brewery workers shows a 12% increase cost of labor—10% in wages and 2% for the week's vacation with pay. We believe in paying good wages: It is impossible, however, for us to continue to pay all these increased expenses without increasing our prices to everyone—dealers and consumers.

Increased Prices Very Small

A case of beer or ale will now retail at \$2.15, just 15 cents more than formerly—or about 7%. The wholesale price per barrel and case to tap rooms and other dealers has been increased in exact proportion. This increase applies to every barrel and case sold by us—in Rochester and elsewhere. Prices have been increased also by breweries all through this state, in New England, the Middle West and elsewhere.

Dealers Must Charge More

If you are served a slightly smaller glass of beer or ale in your favorite tap room—or pay a few cents more for a case of bottled beer at your neighborhood store—don't blame the dealer. He must have a fair margin and should not be expected to absorb these higher costs of production. Higher cost of production is the one and only cause.
