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Retraction Is Asked On Spain Story

Michael Williams Charges Daily Falsified His Position on Spain

NEW YORK—Charging that the New York Evening Post has made false assertions regarding his position in Spain, Michael Williams, Editor of the Commonwealth and Secretary General of the American Committee for Spanish Relief, declares in a letter to Harry J. Gaylor, its editor, which is reprinted in the May 21st issue of the Commonwealth, that he demands a complete retraction on the newspaper's part or he will place the matter in the hands of the Authors' League legal department or his own counsel.

Offers to Debate
The Commonwealth also prints as a part of an open letter, the text of a statement issued by Mr. Williams to David Stern, publisher of the New York Evening Post, challenging him to an open debate on the subject: "Whether or no the Valencia government in Spain is controlled by Communists and Anarchists."

Mr. Williams, suggesting that he and Mr. Stern each post \$1,000, says: "I can win such a debate by presenting the evidence in my possession and by affirming as a fact on the basis of that evidence, that words of any responsible newspaper owner ought to know that the Communists directed from Moscow and the Anarchists of Spain, dictate the so-called democratic government of Spain, which your paper supports."

Mr. Williams suggests that William Allen White of the Emporia Gazette be invited to act as judge of the debate, and that a jury of 12 members be chosen from a distinguished panel he nominates.

The open letter also quotes a letter sent by Professor K. Allison Peers to the editor of the New York Herald Tribune protesting against the one-sided report of his views on the Spanish Civil War given in your issue of today.
