Retraction Is Asked On Spain Story

Michael Williams Charges
Daily Falsified His
Position on Spain

NEW YORK Charging that the New York Evening Post has made false assertions regarding his position on Spain, Michael Williams, Editor of The Commandant and Secretary General of the American Committee for Spanish Relief, declares in a letter to Harry L. Sayler, its editor, which is reprinted in the May 21 issue of The Commandant, that he demands a complete retraction on the newspaper's part, or he will place the matter in the hands of the Authors' League legal department or his own counsel.

Officer to Decide

The Commandant also prints as a part of an open letter the text of a statement issued by Mr. Williams to David Stern, publisher of the New York Evening Post, challenging him to an open debate on the subject. "Whether or no the Valencia government in Spain is controlled by Communists and Anarchists,"

Mr. Williams suggests that he and Mr. Stern each post \$1,000, a sum which he believes will win such a debate by presenting the evidence in my possession and by offering to debate on a fair basis," he writes.

In fact which any responsible newspaper ought to know that the Communists, directed from Moscow, and the Anarchists of Spain dictate the so-called democratic government of Spain, which your papers support.

Mr. Williams suggests that William White of the Empire Gazette be invited to act as judge of the debate and that a jury of 12 members be chosen from a distinguished panel he nominates.
