

Set Summer Sessions for 129 Colleges

36,000 Students Expected To Attend Various Courses Offered

WASHINGTON One hundred and twenty-nine Catholic universities, colleges and normal schools will conduct summer sessions this year, according to information received by the Department of Education, National Catholic Welfare Conference. Twenty-eight of these institutions offer courses for members of their own religious orders.

The enrollment in Catholic summer schools has grown rapidly in recent years. In 1933, a total of 28,000 students were in attendance. In 1935, the number increased to 32,000. It is expected that at least 36,000 students will attend summer sessions this year.

The courses in general are the same type as those offered in the regular school year in colleges and normal schools and are intended especially for students who wish to gain extra credits. The courses are likewise designed to meet the needs of Catholic laymen who desire to advance themselves professionally. Extension courses will be offered by 29 of the institutions.

New Courses
An examination of Summer School bulletins indicates that emphasis will be given this year to courses in Catholic Action, Social Problems, Vocational Guidance and Dramatics.

Among the new courses indicated are: Methods of Art Education; Collateral Literature; Christian Ethnology; Modern Russian Problems; Visual-Audio Education; Elements of Play Production; Gregorian Chant; Lettering; Printing; Binding and Indexing; Orchestration and Instrumentation; History of Books; Educational Adjustments; Pre-Nursing; Public Health; Psychology and Personnel Work; Hospital Personnel Management; Sales Voice and Radio Technique.

N. D. ALUMNI HEAD WILL SPEAK HERE IN 'RED' DRIVE

With Arthur J. Hughes of Chicago, national president of the Alumni Association of the University of Notre Dame, coming here to speak against Communism and subversive activities on Tuesday evening, May 25, at 8:15 p. m. in Columbus Civic Center, Rochester alumni are inviting the general public to lend their aid.

Eugene J. Dwyer, prominent Rochester attorney, will present the speaker.

"Experience already gained by the Notre Dame Alumni shows that the interest in President Hughes' address is far greater than the alumni of the University or even those of Catholic faith.

Communism and the similar doctrine of recent years," states Frank Norton, president of the Notre Dame Club, Rochester in his address, "has made a serious attack on the principles of American government, as contained in all our historic documents of government. They attack every one of the Ten Commandments. They attack private property and the home.

"Notre Dame men, making a study of the situation have concluded that unity must be effected in combating the menace. It is the object of the Alumni Association program to cooperate with established movements where they exist and to lead in cooperative action of all interested groups where such action has not yet been taken."

Mr. Hughes a prominent Chicago attorney, made a special trip to Rome last September where he received from Pope Pius XI a special blessing and great encouragement in the work of the N. D. Alumni Association.

A dinner for Rochester alumni will be held prior to the meeting at the Rochester Club, beginning at 8:00 o'clock.

La Guardia Quotes Encyclical In Talk

NEW YORK—Passages from the recent Encyclical of His Holiness Pope Pius XI on "Atheistic Communism" were read by Mayor Fiorella H. LaGuardia in addressing 2,500 members of the Fire Department Holy Name Society at their annual Communion Breakfast at the Hotel Astor.

Mayor LaGuardia was discussing the restoration of nearly \$9,000,000 in emergency pay cuts to 140,000 city employes when he read the excerpts from the Encyclical urging social justice.

AMSTERDAM—Masses on weekdays and Sundays, including a pontifical High Mass on an open air altar with celebrants from the ranks of Catholic Boy Scouts who will attend the fifth International Jamboree at Bloemendaal, a few miles from Haarlem, July 28 to August 15.

J., Rector of Our Lady's College at Antwerp and General Captain of the Antwerp Baden-Powell Boy Scouts has organized a special Scout evening on the college grounds preparatory to the jamboree. It is expected that 25,000 Scouts from all over the world will take part in the jamboree.

Misinformation Cause Of Bigotry, Reid Claims

NOTRE DAME, Ind.—Non-Catholics of the United States are entitled to an explanation of Catholic doctrine and conduct from their neighbors, Richard Reid, George editor, declared tonight in the opening address of a series he is delivering at the University of Notre Dame.

Mr. Reid, who is editor of The Bulletin, of the Catholic Laymen's Association of Georgia and recipient of the Loretto Medal in 1926, asserted that much of the prejudice in the country today is the cumulative result of 400 years of misinformation which Catholic laymen have seldom bothered to refute.

Hitler Conveys Thanks
VATICAN CITY—There has been received from Chancellor Hitler of Germany a telegram conveying his thanks for the message of condolence which His Eminence Eugenio Cardinal Pacelli, Papal Secretary of State, sent in the name of His Holiness Pope Pius XI on the occasion of the Hindenburg dirigible disaster at Lakehurst.
