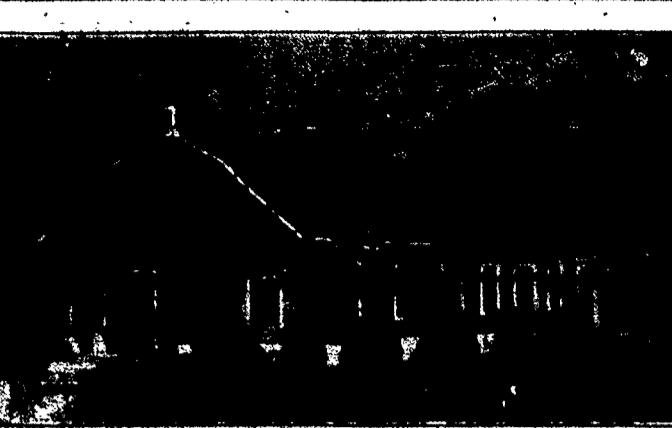

Ground Broken For New Chapel at Boys' Camp

With the breaking of ground this week for the new Chapel to be erected in honor of St. Jude Thaddeus, at Camp Stella Maria, the Diocesan Boys' Camp at Conesus Lake, work will go forward in preparation for the opening of the chapel on Sunday, June 27.

The Chapel is being built in the center of a wooded grove adjoining the camp proper on East Lake Road.

Designed by Thomas Bryan after the pattern of the old Indian Lodge house, the Chapel will accommodate 100 campers and guests.

Table Like Altar - In keeping with the rustic interior, the altar will be done in unfinished red cedar log.

Other friends of the Camp have donated vestments, a chalice, ciboria and Stations of the Cross.

Scout Investiture Rites, Explained

WASHINGTON - Ten thousand copies of the "Catholic Investiture Ceremony for Boy Scouts" have been printed, it has been announced here.

It was first printed in April, 1936, by the National Scout Council, Bureau for the Extension of Scouting.

The leaflet on the Catholic investiture ceremony was compiled by Mr. Louis P. Barco, C.S.C., Field Scout Commissioner, Boy Scouts of America.

SCOUTING

with JIMMY

The program at Camp Pioneer will develop new opportunities for all Scouts this summer according to Forest W. White, Camp Director and Assistant Executive of the Rochester Council.

Opportunities are offered to Senior Scouts in the training for seamanship, boating, canoeing and sailing cruises on Seneca Lake.

The program is under the direction of Forest W. White, Camp Director and Assistant Executive of the Rochester Council.

In addition to the Sea Scout program a new feature will be added this season under the direction of Francis R. McClump, District Commissioner of the Central Division of the Rochester Council.

At Watkins State Park, Scouts will camp in tents under the supervision of a capable leader and will do their own cooking.

Mr. McClump will also be in charge of the Scout camp, consisting of camping, paddling and camp cooking and he will supervise all of the out-of-camp activities including canoe trips and fourteen mile hikes.

The camp trip will be of big feature of the pioneering program as it has in the past and is naturally one of the most important phases in that field.

Commissioner Gerald Williamson has been appointed Assistant Marshal in charge of the Boy Scout Division of the Memorial Day Parade and he hereby issues the following orders:

1. Troops will form in line against each other at Main Street West, right of way on Plymouth Avenue to assist in keeping the public on the walks.

2. When passing the reviewing stand at the Court House, the command "Eyes Right" will be given. Commissioned Officers only will salute. Scouts will salute "Eyes Right" but will not salute.

3. Troops will report to their divisions not later than 9:15. The parade moves at 9:30.

4. American Flags will be carried at the head of the parade. The Scout Division will carry its own Troop flag.

5. Divisions will form as follows: Main Street at South Court, beginning at Plymouth Avenue; Central Division, Liberty Division, Seneca Division, Band, Sunset Division and Inadequate Division respectively.

6. Troops will march with their respective Divisions.

As a result of two courses for Troop Committees during the past Scouters' Institute, there has been developed a 47 page booklet on the functions of the Troop Committee.

This booklet is divided into nine separate functions so arranged that they may be separated and passed out to the various functional committees on the spot.

Plans are being completed for the Camporee to be held at Mandon Falls on June 18-20. Some 4000 Scouts are expected to turn out for this worthwhile demonstration, which is under the sponsorship of the Rochester Council.

It is at the Camporee where the Scouts are given an opportunity to show what achievements they have made in the line of camporee over the previous year and where new Scouts can gain new knowledge for good camping during the summer months.

This year, different arrangements have been made for the staff to serve on committees for the Camporee. Older Scouts are doing the arranging under the supervision of the District Commissioner, instead of the Scouters.

This gives the older boy responsibility and training which will be an asset to him in later years.

Troops who make application for the use of County Parks must now make it on a special form. This permit will be presented to the Park Foreman and must be signed by the foreman at the close of the camping period.
