Nazis Declare Open Warfare On Church

AMSTERDAM—In one of the most violent diatribes he ever delivered, Dr. Josef Goebbels, German "Minister of Propaganda," in a speech at a Berlin mass meeting, expressed "sharp warning" and "strong protest" in very high position would be grided in court under oath if attacks from abroad against the Nazi regime continued in connection with the recent so-called immoral trials.

STRIKE BLOWS AT GERMANY'S CATHOLIC PRESS

Progress toward a show-down in the German Nazi Government's onslaught on religion has continued in increasing tempo. Apparently still smarting under the truths contained in the Pope's Encyclical letter and also more recent outspoken condemnation of the campaign against religion by the Nazi Government is taking further steps of reprisal in Germany.

Apptures for the declaration of His Eminence George Cardinal Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, in which he denounced the persecutory methods of the Nazis continued to rise from individuals, organizations and the press.

The most bitter, virulent reports from Germany, were those directed at Catholic publications. Reports told of the seizure by the Gestapo, Nazi secret police, of the printing plants of 18 Catholic newspapers which printed the Pope's Encyclical.

The same secret political police descended upon the Koenig-Koenig-Blaschke Company, a Catholic publisher, which prints about 200 Catholic publications and ordered that all printing cease until further notice. It was charged that the publications had vilified institutions of the Nazi State.

Otto Knoop, 70 years old a former-Catholic official of Cologne, has been benched for high treason. He was one of a number of de-leaders led by the People's Court in Berlin accused of having had relations with Communist officials to other countries.

Mark Pope's Eightieth Birthday

Apostolic Delegate Speaks In U. S.—Papal Radio Address Cancelled

With his voice carried to every part of the country by radio, His Excellency the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, took part in the celebration of the eightieth birthday of His Holiness Pope Pius XI.

May the Holy Father, Pope Pius XI, in glory of our century, continue for a long time his work of love and of peace," prayed the Apostolic Delegate in his address.

In Vatican City on Monday the world wide radio address of His Holiness was cancelled as a precautionary measure to prevent the Holy Father from becoming fatigued.

Chapel Decorated

The Holy Father's private chapel was adorned with roses and lilies of the valley sent as a gift by airplane from Utrecht, Holland. Eighty roses from the Sisters of the Sacred Heart and a large bouquet of white and pink roses from Mrs. W. J. B. Macaulay, Mrs. former Mrs. Nicholas F. Brady, who is a Papal Duchess.

In the afternoon His Holiness received Cardinal Cicognani, who is dean of the Sacred College of Cardinals, presented the good wishes of the Cardinals.

Pope Praises Al Smith As True Son of Church

VATICAN CITY—Receiving former Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York in a private, and later a public, audience, His Holiness Pope Pius XI praised Mr. Smith as a worthy representative of all that is American in America.

The audience took place at the Papal summer villa at Castelgandolfo.

Mr. Smith presented His Holiness with a miniature reproduction of the Empire State Building and the Pope presented the former Governor with an autographed miniature photograph in a silver frame. The picture was inscribed by the Holy Father with the words "Totus Corde Benedicere" (Blessing You).

His Holiness also presented Mr. Smith with a medal and relics of the Little Flower and a rosary for his wife. In the course of the conversation which followed for 15 minutes, the Holy Father praised former Governor Smith for his frank and public profession of his Catholic Faith.

Following this private audience, Pope Pius received Mrs. Smith and a group of friends, among them Monsignor Fulton J. Sheen of the Catholic University of America.

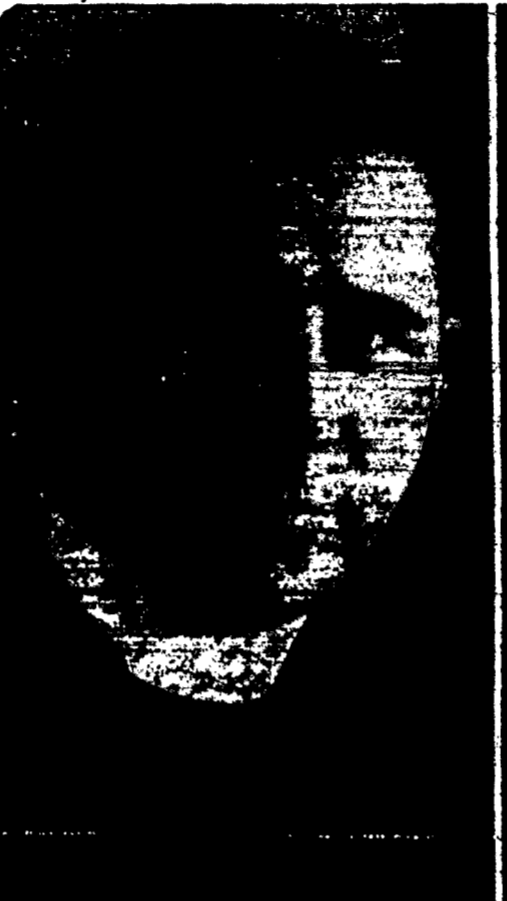
In a public discourse at this audience, Pope Pius said:

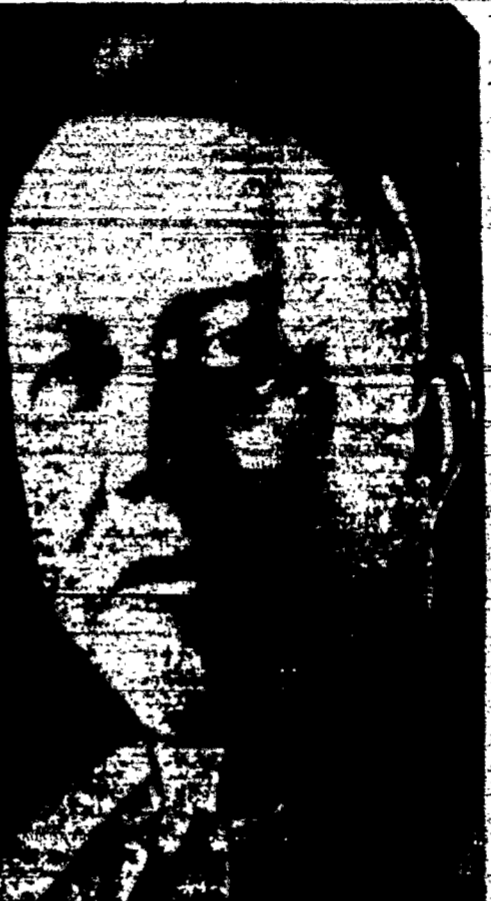

Bishop Foery Says:

Since the day of my ordination I have enjoyed the confidence of the three bishops under whom I have labored. Today, my memory takes me back to my early days as a priest so influenced and encouraged by the interest of Archbishop Hickey; to the later days at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel and beginnings at the Charities so inspired by the leadership and guidance of my late friend, Bishop O'Hern—and in the more recent days—to the wider scope of my work in the Charities and in the Columbus Civic Centre under the thoughtful direction of Archbishop Mooney, who has been so kind to me and who accepted me as a friend from the very beginning of his administration in Rochester.

I have always been happy in my work with my brother priests and this happiness was intensified at the news of my appointment by their many personal calls, telegrams and telephone calls. I want to thank them for their congratulations and their sincere expression of their personal esteem.

To my present assistants at Holy Trinity, to the priests who assisted me in the Charities, to my former assistants at Mt. Carmel, to the zealous Sisters of Mercy and St. Joseph and to my associates at the Catholic Charities and the Columbus Civic Centre, I express my gratitude, and to them all I pay my personal tribute of affection.

I am indeed grateful, more than words can tell, to my former parishioners of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel and my good people of Holy Rosary. Let me say a word of sincere appreciation to the civic and religious organizations of our city which hold up my hands in the work of charity.

To the humble obedience, which I owe to Our Holy Father, I join my profound gratitude and a strong hope that God will sustain me in all that I may be privileged to do for Him.

Archbishop Mooney Says:

Priests and people join with me in rejoicing over the recognition which has come to Father Foery in his appointment as Bishop of Syracuse.

Our joy in his elevation is sincere for we know how well he is equipped for the work that lies before him. Our sorrow at losing him is equally sincere, for we have learned to admire his fine gifts and to love the power of friendship that has made him always, and to all with whom he has had dealings not merely a diocesan official, but more than that—a trusted and valued advisor.

The larger field of action now opening before him should give wider scope for the play of that executive ability that has enabled him to bring to bear his priestly zeal on the betterment of social and economic conditions and the development of the religious spirit in Rochester.

The thought of my own departure from the city and diocese that have been my field of work for nearly four years naturally carries with it a deep sense of regret that the pleasant associations formed during these happy years must now be given up.

The Most Rev. Edward Mooney was born in St. George, Maryland, on May 9, 1867. He was educated at the Mount St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore, Md., and at the University of Maryland, Baltimore, Md.

After completing his studies at the University of Maryland, he was ordained a priest in 1891. He served in various parishes in Maryland and Virginia before being appointed to the parish of St. John the Evangelist in Baltimore in 1901.

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Magr. Healy, Catholic U. Professor, Dies

WASHINGTON—The Rev. Magr. Patrick J. Healy, Professor of Church History at the Catholic University of America, died here last night at the age of 60.

Monsignor Healy, who was a recognized authority on church history, was named a Domestic Prelate with the title of Right Reverend Monsignor only last month. A native of Waterford, Ireland, Monsignor Healy was educated at the Catholic University of America. He was the author of a number of books on religious and social conditions and held membership in historical, political, science and other learned societies.

Foreclosure on St. Mary's College On the Coast

SAN FRANCISCO—The trustees of St. Mary's College, including the buildings and land comprising the college campus at Moraga, St. Mary's High School in Oakland, and independent holdings in San Leandro and San Francisco, are to be sold at a foreclosure sale in Oakland on June 25, according to an announcement made this week by the Central Bank of Oakland, trustee of the mortgage of \$1,000,000 in defaulted bonds issued by the institution in 1922.
