'Godless Attaches' Named by Soviet For Spain, Mexico

GENEVA—"Godless Attaches" have been appointed both for the Soviet Embassy in Mexico and the one in Spain. These new members of the Soviet diplomatic service are assigned "to study cultural and religious problems" in their territories. They were specially trained for their task at the Moscow "Godless Institute." Similar functionaries are to be appointed for all the other diplomatic Soviet Embassies and Legations the world over.

In Kady the Secretary General of the Ukrainian Communist Party stated in the course of a public speech that the new Soviet Constitution was "not made for the enemies of the regime, but for the well behaving citizens." The newly granted freedom, he asserted, should not be used for religious propaganda. "Spain," the speaker said, "was born atheist, he is an atheist today and will always remain an atheist. He wants only that the struggle against the churches be carried on without violence and propaganda means. He wants all means of subordination eventually to be taken from the clergy of all denominations."

PRIEST SPEAKS FIRST TIME AT GRADUATION RITE

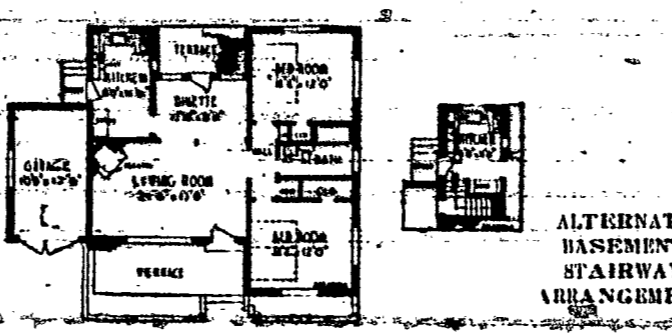

'I Covered Madrid'

in front of my typewriter, burying myself in the wall. I had been sitting in that chair a minute before. I was walking to the embassy another night after I had abandoned my apartment, and had to start to the ground when bullets started whizzing. A militiaman's gun had gone off by accident, another militiaman on the other side of the boulevard thought someone was sniping at him in his direction, and that started the barrage. All the correspondents could recall similar experiences while waiting at night. That was one of the nastiest parts about our job, getting to and from our fittings, the shadows lurked men with their trigger fingers and their inclination was to shoot first and ask questions afterwards. This random shooting has fallen off considerably since the government forces started a "shoot your will let's-for-the-front" campaign and taking rifles away from those doing city patrol duty. I showed in my apartment, situated just across the street from the stock exchange and one block from the Ministry of Communications, one of the chief targets of the rebels' bombs and shells until life there became extremely unhealthful. Incidental Flares The evening I decided to go to the American embassy, where the rest of the American population of Madrid was quartered, bengaline incendiary flares were dropped by planes all around the square embracing the ministries of war, finance and communications, and the stock exchange. Twelve of them landed in the street in front of my house and illuminated the area as brightly as daylight. We dashed out into the street and threw water on the flares but that only made them burn the more brightly. The planes still were droning above us and, fearing every second they would unleash a cargo of bombs, we scraped buckets of earth from inside the curbing and finally managed to douse the flares. Bombs dropped the two previous days had wrecked part of the Prado museum and torn up a considerable part of the avenue just behind my place, so I decided it was time to get out of there without delay. Life in the embassy was quite easy, although the food was extremely limited and we had to "piece out" with canned stuff we had purchased earlier in the siege. Once inside the embassy, all those except newspaper correspondents were obliged to stay inside the embassy grounds, and the 150 persons, including many Puerto Ricans and Filipinos, had acute lack of boredom between the bombardments. Most of the refugees in our embassy slept on mattresses placed on the floor. I was lucky to have a little better. I had had a cot sent out from my house the cot the maid had slept on—and, save for the nights when the heavy firing got on my jangled nerves so I couldn't sleep, got along splendidly. The cot was gone but nights were made chocolate in a little electric pot I had and ate cakes from my store of food and sat around and speculated on how long the damned war would last. The front line had crawled into University City, less than a mile from the embassy, and some nights the heavy artillery and hand grenades and machine guns and rifles joined in such horrible cacophony sleep was impossible. We would go out on the roof of the embassy and watch the artillery flashes streak the sky and wonder if this was the night. Everybody thought it would be soon how could the city's defenders last so long? But they're still lasting.

URGES GETTING SECURITY ACCOUNT

A Social Security Account should be opened by everyone who is or expects to become employed. The part-time in a covered employment," urges Walter Krust, manager of the Social Security Board 214 Terminal Building here. He points out that the Account is of ever-increasing value, not only because of the annuity which will be paid for old age and disability, but also because the Social Security Account number is used for identification and eligibility for Unemployment Insurance. Those who have not obtained their account numbers are urged to do so without further delay at the nearest post office. After July 1, opening of accounts and issuance of account cards will be done through offices of the Social Security Board. Mr. Krust stresses the importance of obtaining the Social Security Account and keeping the account number card handy. He urges every employee to call his account number to the employer as soon as hired. Employers are requested to report the number of every employee for even an hour's paid work in covered occupation.
