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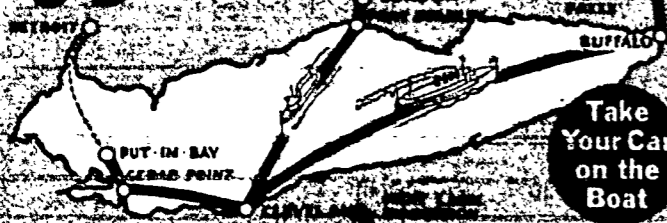
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Primate Puts Blame For Persecutions

Archbishop Says Mexican Officials Exceeded Authority

MEXICO CITY—It is evident that in great part the difficulties which have arisen out of the fact that State legislatures exceeded their power in the constitution, the Most Rev. Luis M. Martinez, Archbishop of Mexico, stated in a special interview in which the Primate of Mexico discussed the recent Supreme Court decision granting the protection of the Court to three priests of the State of Chihuahua.

But, His Excellency pointed out under the law this decision does not establish a precedent, and, therefore, would not arouse much excitement.

The Supreme Court decision is a significant incident in the development of the religious problems in Mexico, Archbishop Martinez said. This decision, which will be in strict accordance with the intentions for the State Legislatures' amendments prescribed for them by the General Constitution of the Republic. It is evident that in great part difficulties which occur in religious matters in Mexico are caused by the excess of power under the Constitution.

Hopes for Greater Liberty
 The attitude which inspired this decision continues to prevail, the Primate said, and he hopes for the greater freedom in Mexico in the direction of greater liberty.

But, in order not to make prophecies that might be too optimistic, it is well to note here that, under the law of apparition now in force, the decisions of the Supreme Court are required to establish a precedent (Article 193).

The Primate's Motive
 It is an accepted fact that in persecuting the religious persecution in Mexico to attract the attention of the people from other evils of his administration, former President Calles called for the State Legislatures to State Government to further the persecution in their respective States.

The Governors, in order to demonstrate their support of Calles, in addition carried the persecution to exaggerated lengths the worst instance being the State of Tlaxcala, Campeche, Chiapas, Sonora, Vera Cruz and Oaxaca. The majority of the laws on religious worship enacted or decreed at that period are still in force.

President Lazaro Cardenas has not only repealed the laws on religious worship, but he has also ordered that he has no prejudice against the religious persecutions.

Clergy Foes Arouse Ire Over Border

German Catholics in Czechoslovakia Score Detractions of Priests

PRAGUE—German Catholics in Czechoslovakia whose speeches and manifestations are not restricted by any State power are defending in the press and at public meetings the good reputation of Germany's priests and members of religious Orders.

At a meeting of Volkshund Deutscher Katholiken held at Chab, Czechoslovakia, near the German border, speakers of the Volkshund dealt with the present situation of the Church in Germany.

With regard to Nazi Minister of Propaganda Goebbels' anti-Catholic radio oratory, a resolution was passed unanimously expressing its disapproval of the "Goebbels" attitude toward the Church's priests and Religious. The resolution maintains that it does not desire to meddle with internal-political business of the German Reich but that, however, it is a command of national honor and Catholic solidarity that answer be made to these "unheard-of attacks."

"A Resolute Reply"
 "Real fault, found by impartial judges should not be tolerated or excused," the resolution continues, "but the same justice should be meted out to all, including Catholic priests and Religious."

"These must be resolute reply when, in place of the few who are really to blame, all the priests and Religious are branded as 'criminals.'"

"We know our priests," the resolution states, "and their work in the pulpit, confession and social activities and we have unlimited confidence in them. We 'foreign Germans' are standing in full loyalty to Germany's priests who come from the people and live for the people's sake, because they are and have always been our unselfish fish leaders in the campaign for natural rights."

"Our confidence cannot be shattered either by trespasses of a few individuals or by unjust general accusations, wherever they come from."

"We deplore the radio attacks against the Church and its priests, also because thereby the good name of the German nation is tainted before other nations."

"We expect the Catholics of the whole world to manifest in a powerful and efficacious way their brotherly attachment to their hard-pressed co-religionists and all the Catholics in the Reich."

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SCOUTS HERE CARRY MESSAGE TO FRANCE

Members of the Boy Scout Troops of Rochester going to the International Jamboree in Holland will bear with them a message to M. Jacques Vaillant de Guella in Paris from the Rochester Council, Boy Scouts of America.

They will greet Monsieur de Guella during the month, which is the 25th anniversary of the Seneca Indians expedition against the Seneca Indians.

These Indians, the letter to the distinguished Frenchman will say, the westernmost tribe of the Iroquois League occupied the region of modern Rochester before 1800. Prominent among the priests and chaplains of this army was Monsieur de Guella's ancestral relative, the Rev. Francois Vaillant de Guella S. J.

Compiled by Alexander M. Stewart, the letter contains an historically accurate account of the Seneca expedition to this area and of the claiming by Governor de Denonville of territory in this region for Louis XIV of France by one of the missionary Jesuit priests in which the missionary Jesuit priest had an important part.

The letter contains cordial greetings to Monsieur de Guella, and to all French people, "from the citizens of the region of Rochester who are now commemorating a debt to the scouting and exploring of the Frenchmen which we never can fully repay."

MURPHY VISIONS OF LABOR TROUBLES

PITTSBURGH—With a more general recognition by the public of the social benefits which accrue from the establishment of labor's rights, we may soon be able to substitute for the present, archaic method of solving employer-employee problems by combat, the sane and orderly processes of justice. Governor Frank Murphy of Michigan declared in his address to the graduates at the commencement exercises of Duquesne University here Wednesday.

"I cannot and will not be done however," the Governor added, "if government pursues the futile philosophy of indifference, if it is negative in its attitude, if it is bureaucratic and rigid. The sole purpose of government is to attain the greatest possible degree of well-being for those whom it serves. To do so it is self-evident that government must be the steady and energetic friend and leader."

Asserting that the current struggle is a bitter one and that many of the onlooking public have been prone to take sides, Governor Murphy said:

"The extremists on the side of labor consider it a battle against property rights to be fought, if necessary with whatever weapon of force and violence the laborer has at his command. The extremists on the side of capital approve the use of a variety of repressive and coercive measures by employers themselves, and further demand that government donate its armed power to the one cause of 'keeping the western man in his place.' There is a futile opposition to human rights."
