Msgr. Ready, Dr. Haas Elevated

Pope Names Two Noted Priests As Domestic Prelates

Two distinguished priests known in Rochester and the speaker are Priests by His Holiness Pope Pius XI with the titles of Right Reverend Monsignor.

They are the Very Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Ready, pastor of St. Francis de Sales, and the Rev. Dr. Francis J. Haas, Rector of the Seminary of St. Francis de Sales.

Monseigneur Ready, who was in Rochester during the speaker's table during the Catholic Press Association banquet in May, spent two years in Rome as St. Bernard's Seminary before going to the Seminary of St. Francis de Sales, Rochester.

Here in 1921 in the National Council of Catholic Men's Convention, which he spoke during the Catholic Congress in Washington, D.C., he has a nationwide reputation in the field of social legislation.

Monseigneur Ready was appointed General Secretary of the N.C.W.C. by the Administrative Board of Bishops at its meeting in Washington last November, succeeding the late Rev. Msgr. John J. Burke, C.S.B., who had held the office from the inception of the N.C.W.C. in 1919 until his death on October 1, 1935.

Monseigneur Haas was Director of the National Catholic School of Social Work in Washington, D.C., and was a member of the National Labor Board, and in October of last year appointed him to the National Labor Board.

In September, 1934, Dr. Haas was named Labor Representative on the General Code Authority of the National Treasury Administration, and in July, 1935, he was appointed to the Labor Policy Board of the World Progress Administration.
