CHURCH WITHOUT ROOF

Egyptian Bishop Writes About New Parish

Egypt once a bright and glorious center of Christianity is today in the hands of Mohammedans. The native Christians, who are known as Coptic number about eight hundred thousand and of these less than fifty thousand are Catholics. There are over fifteen million people in Egypt. The Catholics are not accepted by the Separated people and they are persecuted by the Mohammedans. It is not easy to work in Egypt, and our missionaries have a hard life.

Bishop Khouzam, the Catholic Coptic Bishop, is about forty-five years old. He is very active and progressive. He speaks English well. He is father to his priests and people. His door is always open, and even the youngest child as welcome at any time. We received the following letter from him:

"At Toua, one of our villages, we have built a Church, but it is only half completed. It needs a roof and must be paved and furnished. During good weather we can use it, but when the rain comes, this will be impossible. As an extension, we have two rooms for the priest. Here he lives and gathers the children for instruction and his converts for catechism.

"In spite of the pastor's poverty, and even in his room of the fact that the walls of his spots are not plastered and that the floor is a dirt floor, he managed to do very well. He has already made converts and is hopeful.

"We wish to complete this church. We can put on a roof and pave the church and furnish it with a suitable Altar, Vestments, Crucifix and Candelsticks, Chalice and Missal, all for Three Hundred Dollars. Fifty dollars more will take care of the priest house and make it presentable.

"I assure you the Church will pay dividends in souls. It is in a very promising village. If any member of your Association will send me \$250, I will allow him or her to select the name of this chapel. The donor can decide the Saint to whom this chapel will be dedicated.

"We hope somebody will answer this appeal of Bishop Khouzam. It is an opportunity of doing something really big for Our Divine Lord. Let us hear from you.
