**K. C. Votes  
To Renew  
'Red Drive'**

Reaffirms Mexican Protest; All Officers Renamed

**SAN ANTONIO, TEX.** - Continuation of their vigorous campaign against atheistic Communism and a renewal of their protest against the persecution of the Catholic Church in Mexico were voted by the Knights of Columbus in the closing hours of the organization's fifty-fifth supreme convention here last week.

The resolution through which the action was taken declared that the Knights will reiterate their uncompromising and unalterable opposition to Communism and to every other "ism" that is foreign to the Christian and patriotic traditions of the temporal and eternal welfare of the people and redemptive to the minds of all who prefer truth over falsehood, freedom over slavery, and Christ over the "Christ" and that they will continue their crusade against Communism with every faculty and all the power at our command to the end that exposed to the light of truth in which all things, evil and good, are made manifest, will drive from the earth which it pollutes.

The resolution also provided that the Supreme Board of Directors be authorized in its discretion to assess and expend for this purpose a sum not exceeding 25 cents per member.

Another resolution renewed the protest of the Knights against the persecution of religion and the death of human and divine rights to the Mexican people by the Government of Mexico.

It also renewed the organization's appeal to the American Government to renounce against those violations of civil and religious rights and pledged to the Mexican people a continuation of the organization's efforts in their behalf and to insure that the interests of the Knights of Columbus in the Mexican and their welfare remain steadfast and unabated.

All Officers Re-elected  
At the supreme officers of the organization were re-elected. They were:

Callahan, of Washington, D. C., Supreme Treasurer; Luke E. Hart, of St. Louis, Supreme Advocate; E. J. and W. Fahney, of St. Paul, Minn., Supreme Physicians; David J. and the Rt. Rev. Mgr. John J. McInerney, of St. Paul, Minn., Supreme Chaplain.

The convention of 3,000 members of the Knights of Columbus attended in sessions this week, which featured important addresses by prominent speakers and other leaders.

Archbishop Francis Spellman presided over the opening of the convention formally on Monday morning with a pontifical Mass at San Fernando Cathedral. The celebrant was the Most Rev. Mariano B. Garriga, Coadjutor Bishop of Corpus Christi, and the sermon was preached by the Most Rev. Arthur J. Drossaert, Archbishop of San Antonio.

Following the Mass Mr. Carmody presided at the Alamo, where the first session of the convention was held.

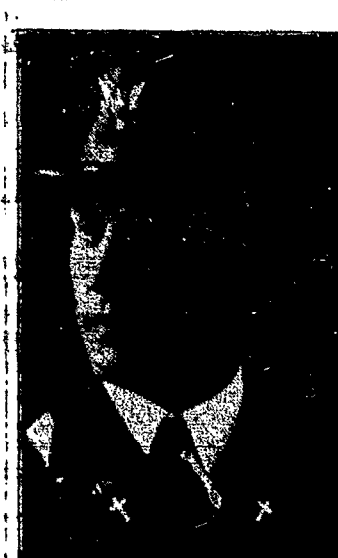

**Father Koch Returns  
With Congress Films**

Army Chaplain, Aide at Manila Eucharistic Meet, Visits Here

The Rochester priest who had general charge of arrangements and events for the great international Eucharistic Congress held in Manila in February of last year and who on recent furlough in China was forced to flee with other American refugees prior to the present Sino-Japanese outbreak, returned home Friday to visit relatives here. He is the Rev. Joseph R. Koch, former Holy Redeemer parish here, United States Army Chaplain and priest of the Diocese of Denver, who was stationed at Manila at the time of the Congress and has now been assigned to Fort Benning, Georgia.

While in Peiping, China, Father Koch with the others was given one hour's notice to leave the Chinese city.

Brings "Movies"  
With him, Father Koch brought motion pictures of the Congress taken by the Rev. Eugene A. Gisel, S. J., another Rochester priest who is teaching at the Ateneo de Manila, in the Philippines.

At the 30th annual gathering of the Merkel family held at the homes of Mrs. John Woerner and Mrs. Florence O'Connell on Ridge Road East, his sisters, Father Koch, showed the pictures Sunday evening and explained the elaborate plans necessary in staging the Congress, which he said was the greatest religious gathering ever held in the Orient.

It was believed by those in charge of these International Congresses, Father Koch said, that such an undertaking could not be attempted in the Far East and of the results shown in the picture and the spiritual results that have followed the Congress proved that it could be done, the Rochester priest stated.

No Hospital Cases  
With him and a half persons present on the closing day of the Congress in Manila, a city of about 350,000 population and with thousands on the other days taking part in the month's sessions and children's services, Father Koch said the remarkable thing was that there was not one hospital accident case. His committee had twenty ambulances ready, but they were not used.

The motion pictures depict in close-up and far range views the impressive services so well arranged in advance. They give some idea of the fifty-five nations that were the guests of the Congress.

He will go to New York Friday and expects to return again for another visit before taking up duties at Fort Benning.

Father Koch said that he had served with the Rev. William Richard Arnold, who was the chief of chaplains for the United States Army. Father Arnold is a member of the 1908-1909 class of St. Bernard's Seminary.

Democrat's Faith  
For the first time in history flags of 216 nations were carried in procession and these flags symbolized the political views of their allegiance to Christianity, Father Koch said.

Mr. Brown inflicted his views on the ANG so successfully at the St. Louis convention that a resolution was passed endorsing the Spanish Lefists.

But the boys back home couldn't swallow that. Heywood, they argued, did great work in organizing the Guild but the inclination of his personal likes or dislikes on the members of the large wasn't part of the bargain.

Right now the guild has launched a national referendum which many guildsmen hope will repudiate the stand taken by the St. Louis convention on the Spanish question and kindred subjects.

Reputation of those resolutions means repudiation of Mr. Brown's philosophy.

One wonders how Mrs. Roosevelt, as a fellow guildswoman, will cast her ballot in this referendum.

Senate Fails To Consider Issue; 5 Catholics Favor Confirmation

**WASHINGTON** - The confirmation of Senator Black as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court has been formally put to the Senate but it has not disposed of the controversy to which his appointment gave rise.

The question of his eligibility, raised in the Senate debate, has not been fully answered. It has been formally put to the Supreme Court itself, which is the only institution which can authoritatively determine whether he is qualified, under the Constitution, to sit on the Supreme Bench.

Specifically, it is asked whether a member of the Congress, which passed the retirement bill, is debarred from occupying an office the "emoluments" of which were increased. It is regarded as very doubtful that the Supreme Court will undertake to pass on that question. There is a possibility, however, that Justice Black's competency may be challenged again in the course of an ordinary legal case before the tribunal.

Copeland's Attack  
In discussing the nomination, the Senate shied away from the generally-accepted fact that Justice Black had cultivated the Ku Klux Klan and was supported by it in his first senatorial campaign.

The matter was brought up by Senator Copeland, who said: "If there is a doubt in senatorial minds about his connection with the Klan, the nomination should be recommended so that the Judiciary Committee may investigate and find the truth."

"It may well be, of course," Senator Copeland said, "that the majority of the Senate feel that it makes no difference whether the nominee is or is not a Klansman. For my part, I feel it makes a vast difference. I do not believe that a man whose mind may be fossilized as regards the rights of certain classes of people should sit upon the Bench."

Bankhead To Defense  
Senator Bankhead, in reply, cited the statement of the impartial witness of the Klan that Senator Black was not a member of the organization. He also read a number of communications from Catholics, Jews and Negroes in his State commending the appointment of Senator Black and extolling his qualifications as a judge.

Senators seemed to wish to wave off the charge that Senator Black's relationship with the Klan, whatever it might have been, disqualified him as a member of the tribunal which is regarded as the protector of constitutional rights. Sixteen members of the Senate failed to vote at all, these including five Catholics, six Protestants and five who voted by Catholicism.

No Catholic vote was cast against the appointment Senator Ashurst, chairman of the Judiciary Committee which considered the nomination said in the course of his remarks:
