Divine Law Issue Today

Hierarchy of San Antonio Province Offer Solutions

SAN ANTONIO—The issue of between blind obedience to the divine law and insistent rebellion between the spirit and the flesh, between order and chaos, the Bishops of the Province of San Antonio declare, commenting upon the problems of the day in a joint Pastoral Letter made public this week.

It is ours largely to determine how the issue shall be decided. The Bishops tell their people that the world will perish because of the seeds of destruction latent in its false philosophy and wrong which will vanish the precious heritage of Christian civilization or the faith wherein is victory will save the world and with it our cherished institutions.

The tragedy of the age is that the conquests have been made in the name of liberty, but the slavery of liberty appears to be bringing a new era of slavery.

It is a mistake to look upon social security acts and public relief measures as gigantic governmental charities. They represent the official discharge of a public duty. However, private charity and public relief are the natural and desirable approach in the matter of socialization of wealth.

The true solution of this problem lies in the cultivation of social justice through the force of moral force or legislation but through the promptings of enlightened Christians.

Support of public and private charities according to one measure is a duty incumbent upon the whole community.

It is outrageous that citizens be penalized upon the name of unemployment insurance. The promoters of such a law are maintaining birth control measures to suffer untimely taxation in order to support an unproductive population.

Those who possess property have a sacred obligation to give their earth's bounty by affording them an opportunity to work. The possessors of wealth have an obligation to furnish employment as well as an indispensable social security. Right to Organize.

Sound Christian ethics recognize that labor has a right to organize and that great benefits are derived from workingmen's organizations.

The Church's attitude of the matter of education today is vigorously applauded by a vast number of Catholics who realize that spiritual illiteracy is the most appalling form of human ignorance.
