Gets Mass Fund In Will Case

Magr. Hart to Distribute Stipends In Issue Decided By Canon Law

A significant case involving the application by the Civil Court of the Canon Law of the Church regarding the distribution of money will be argued at this week's session of the Surrogate Court in the receipt of a check for \$5,840.00 by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, Administrator of the Diocese.

The decree was rendered by Surrogate George W. Pratt of Steuben County in the estate of James Loucks, deceased Civil War veteran.

Magr. Hart said the money will be turned over immediately to priests both within and outside the diocese for Masses for the repose of Mr. Loucks' soul.

Mr. Loucks was a Civil War veteran who spent the later years of his life at the Soldiers' Home at Bath. He died there in 1934 at the age of 80.

He left a will in which he directed that the residue of his estate, after payment of minor bequests, be expended for offerings for Masses for his own soul and that of his deceased brother, Daniel.

Masses Not Paid

He named the Herkimer Trust Company of Little Falls, N. Y. as Executor of the will. More than two years elapsed after the demise of Mr. Loucks and in the meantime the Executor failed to have the Masses said, as provided in the will.

The Executor filed its account about August 8, 1936, and asked for the instruction of the court regarding the distribution of the fund and claimed that it had the right to distribute the fund for Masses at such times as it saw fit.

The Executor asked that it be directed to expend the money at stated times in the future, spread over a period of years.
