Missionaries Of U.S. Safe In Peiping

Religious In Other Zones Of China In Peril; Do Heroic Work

By REV. FRED C. DIETZ, M. M. (Cable to N. C. W. C. News Service) PEIPING. All American Catholic missionaries laboring in the Peiping zone are safe and are now actively engaged in performing the duties of their various posts.

There is reason to believe that the same situation prevails with relation to American Catholic missionaries in other zones, but details concerning their position are unavailable because inter-communication is difficult at this time.

Word from various sources concerning conditions in strife-torn China while it speaks of no actual harm to American Catholic missionaries, tells of three- or four- Catholic missionaries being in a dangerous spot in Shantung Province.

Consulate Closed. Sixty Catholic priests and nuns were among the approximately 100,000 who fled the interior of the Province of Shantung, but they were concentrated at their mission stations.

The consulate at Tsinan was closed on August 27, and this greatly increases the difficulty of communicating with Americans in Shantung. Their position was reported particularly perilous at a time when a large band of Chinese irregulars conducted an early morning raid on a mission establishment of French Marists northwest of Peiping.

The decision to evacuate was arrived at after four bombs fell on the hospital compound and the shells struck the hospital, but the nuns decided to remain at their posts.

The Hospital of the Sacred Heart housed 300 patients at the time the bombs fell, and the nuns felt compelled to leave the situation and take their charges out of danger. In addition, they had treated hundreds of wounded soldiers and cared for more than 1000.

SHANGHAI. No actual fighting has been reported so far among the Catholic missionaries in and around Shanghai, the area now being held by Chinese and Japanese bombers and artillery.

Considerable anxiety is felt for the priests, Brothers and Sisters, however, in view of the fact that many of the educational and charitable institutions maintained by the Church in Shanghai are located in Chinese sections, outside the foreign concessions and international quarters.

Shanghai Vicariate. The Vicariate of Shanghai, which comprises a fair portion of Kiangsu Province adjoining the metropolitan area, has a personnel of 178 priests, 123 Brothers and 500 Sisters. Approximately one-third of these are Chinese, while the others are of various nationalities with some Americans, Irish, Scots, Canadians and English. The Vicariate has over 200 schools and 30 institutions of charity.

In the very heart of the city is the large charitable center conducted by Lo Pa Hong, where more than 2000 sick or destitute find a home, and where 500 dispensary cases are handled daily.

In the war zone to the north Catholics are numerous. The Province of Hopei, where the fighting first broke out and which includes the big centers of Peiping, Tientsin, Peking, Chengde and other cities has 780,435 Catholics, that is more than a quarter of all Catholics in China.

At Peiping where the first conversions date back to the days of Father Ricci in the early part of the seventeenth century, the Apostolic Delegate has his residence.
