Administrator Recalls Events At Cathedral

(The following article written by the Rt. Rev. Wm. M. Hart, Administrator of the Diocese and Pastor of Corpus Christi Church appeared in last Sunday's Corpus Christi Church Bulletin. It is reproduced herewith in its entirety.)

Today, history will be made in Catholic Rochester in the closing act of religion in historic St. Patrick's Cathedral.

The last Mass today will be the last service in the stately edifice, that has been the scene of so many of the stirring and significant events that have marked the history of Catholicism in our city.

What memories will be stirred in the breasts of venerable parishioners and former parishioners? The oldest among them may recall vaguely the earlier church that served the city up to the close of the Civil War.

Many will relive the glorious days that saw Rochester erected into a diocese, that witnessed the coming of the young Bernard J. McQuaid to be its first Bishop, that gave to the city its first experience of the solemn ritual of the Church for the in- intense activity

1868 to 1898 was a period of intense activity in the Church of Rochester, a period of growth and planning for the future, of providing the needed institutions

1898 marked the consecration of the Cathedral now completed and brought to the perfect form in which the gifted architect had conceived it. A host of dignitaries from far and near graced the occasion.

Year after year the memory of that consecration was renewed in the prayers and ceremonies of Holy Mass and of the Divine Office, recited on each morning of the month of October. The marble crosses set in the hallowed walls of this edifice dedicated to God's service, each supporting a bronze candlestick constantly reminded the congregation that the place was a holy one, none other than the House of God and the Gate of Heaven.

The Bishop's throne was in evidence as a reminder that here was the seat of authority of a successor of the Apostles. Four prelates had occupied that place of honor and jurisdiction as Bishop of Rochester.

Many classes of Ordained priests were raised to the dignity of Holy Orders before that altar presents for service in the diocese, and prior to service in places beyond Rochester.

Five times that sanctuary was the scene of the Solemn Consecration of a Bishop of the Church of God, Prince of the Church had visited St. Patrick's, had officiated at liturgical functions, Legates of the Holy See, the Apostolic Delegates, famous Archbishops and Bishops from home and abroad, had spoken from its pulpit. Just a few names are ready to our memories.

CATHEDRAL HIGH ALTAR WAS GIFT OF FR. O'DONOGHUE

The high altar of the Cathedral which will be dedicated in the Cathedral of the Sacred Heart is fashioned of marble and has been used for nearly forty years.

It was erected in the Cathedral in 1893 as the gift of the Rev. Frank H. O'Donoghue, C. M. in memory of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James O'Donoghue, lifelong members of the parish.

On the rear of the altar is attached a slab of black marble which reads: "Of your charity pray for the souls of Mr. and Mrs. James O'Donoghue, whose son, Rev. Frank H. O'Donoghue built this altar."

The East Side altar at St. Patrick's was of Gothic style. It was dedicated to the memory of the Very Rev. Richard O'Reilly, V. G. According to tradition it was built for \$100.

The West Side altar of the Blessed Virgin was the gift of a prominent non-Catholic woman of leading Rochester family who had a great devotion to the Blessed Virgin but died outside the Church.

The altar was of French style with the Madonna and Child in Baldachina effect. In the panels are depicted the mysteries of the Annunciation and Birth.
