The Stanton-Baker Administration Record

- Reduced the city's debt from \$70,431,060 in 1934 to \$63,421,500 in 1937 -- A NET REDUCTION OF \$7,009,560. It was accomplished by borrowing less than the amount of debt paid off each year.
- Reduced interest requirements on the outstanding debt by more than \$700,000. It was accomplished by reducing the city's debt and calling old high-interest rate bonds and refunding them at lower interest rates.
- Rehabilitated the city's credit, which had fallen into low repute in 1933 under a former Republican administration, to one of the most attractive credit risks in the country.
- Restored branch libraries, closed all but two afternoons a week in 1933, to full time schedule.
- Brought new industries to Rochester, notably the General Motors unit which will add millions to local payrolls and give employment to thousands. Also facilitated the Bond Clothing and other factory expansion programs.
- Provided weekly ash collections during late Fall and Winter months.
- Kept the spoils system out of City Hall by retaining efficient city employees without reference to their politics.
- Reduced the bus and trolley fare to the lowest average fare of any city in the state by inaugurating the weekly pass.
- Provided bus transportation on many lines in place of street cars and paved miles of streets to the great satisfaction of property owners and the public generally.
- Co-operated with the Federal Public Works Administration and built many important public buildings and other public improvements at almost half-cost to real estate taxpayers.
- Paved South Clinton, Hudson, Joseph and Chili Avenues and many other streets, some of which are in your neighborhood, without assessment against your property.
- Provided adequate lighting in streets that were half dark in 1933.
- Maintained efficient police and fire departments, thereby making the city a safe place to live in and giving the citizens the benefit of low fire insurance rates.
