Alumni Back Rightists In Spain War

Catholic College Grads Support Bishops' Stand On Red Regime

BOSTON The National Catholic Alumni Federation, in the closing hours of its biennial convention, here, adopted a resolution, among others commending the Nationalist cause in Spain and placing the organization in support of the Spanish Hierarchy in its condemnation of the minority that has outraged the Christian spirit of the Spanish people.

Another resolution adopted by the Federation pledges the organization to spiritual and material aid to those priests and religious devoting their lives to the welfare of the Negro and otherwise to help the colored race in this country.

Arthur J. Hughes was elected President of the Federation at its election here Saturday afternoon. Other officers chosen are: Edmund E. Butler, Chairman of the Executive Committee; Roy A. Bronson, Bernard I. Carroll and James F. Armstrong, Vice Presidents; Edward W. Gould, Secretary; John T. Balfe, Assistant Secretary.

Red Minority Controls The resolution on Spain declared that in this country a minority movement subsidized by subversive forces from outside has captured the legitimacy of government of this country and has transformed it into a Communist and anti-democratic regime which has violated every fundamental principle of civil and religious liberty.

Resolving that the organization "make every effort to prevent the truth about Spain to all sincere believers in God in this country," the Federation's statement declares:

"WHEREAS a movement representing the majority of Spain has arisen to defend that country against an alien ideology and to safeguard the Christian faith and traditions of an ancient people, and

"WHEREAS in the United States various groups have organized themselves for purposes of propaganda in favor of the Lefist faction in Spain and against the Nationalist movement of General Franco and have deliberately concealed the activities of the Lefist faction with the principles of American democracy and have thus misled large sections of our people truly devoted to democratic institutions.

Support Spanish Hierarchy "THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the NCAF unreservedly take its stand with the Spanish Hierarchy in its condemnation of the minority that has outraged the Christian spirit of the Spanish people and be it further

"FURTHER RESOLVED that we demand the Nationalist cause which has opposed itself to this minority in order to rescue and preserve Christian civilization in the Iberian peninsula, and be it further

"RESOLVED that we wholeheartedly condemn the efforts to resist the Christian forces of this country in aid of a movement which is bent upon the destruction of both belief in God and of democratic institutions; and

"RESOLVED that the chapters of the NCAF make every effort to present the truth in their position to all sincere believers in God in this country.

Challenge To Catholics In its resolution concerning the Negro, the Federation declares that hardly more than 250,000 of the 12,000,000 Negroes in the United States are Catholic, adding that this condition "is a grave challenge to the charity and zeal of Catholics in this country." The burden of the apostolate among this group, the resolution goes on, "cannot be shifted entirely to the shoulders of the 200 priests and 1,000 religious who are devoting their entire lives to this task." The Catholic-lady, it says must help, particularly alumni.

The resolution says "the Negro in the United States is the object of a concerted attack from those who are seeking to destroy man's liberty and spiritual dignity." "The Negro," it adds, "has been singled out by the Communists for their special predilection since they look forward to the formation of a Negro proletariat as an important adjunct to their cause, where seeds of class hatred and social discontent may be sown without hindrance."

ARREST CLERGY AND LAY LEADERS IN NAZI DRIVE

AMSTERDAM-In the course of their persistent persecution of the Catholic clergy the Nazi secret police have put under arrest the dean of the Cathedral in St. Wendel, Sarre territory, the dean of St. Anne's Church there, two assistant pastors of the Cathedral, four missionary Fathers of St. Wendel and three prominent Catholic laymen.

The laymen arrested are the chief organist of St. Mary's hospital, Dr. Engelender, the tobacco manufacturer, Herr Koehler and the trader, with the latter were his daughter and his two young women secretaries.

All are accused of subversive propaganda. The alleged propagandists have distributed privately copies of the recent Encyclical of the Holy Father on Nazi paganism and copies of various racial tracts of German Bishops.

With the same ruthlessness the Nazi regime continues to abolish all vestiges of Catholic and Christian influence in the public schools, advice received here reveals. The Most Rev. Konrad Count von Freyburg, Bishop of Bonn, has pointed out in a Pastoral decree from all the pulpits of his diocese that the slogan of the Nazi propaganda campaign "throw the priests out of the schools" is now being fulfilled.

The campaign against the Church, said Bishop von Freyburg, being carried on in a disguised but energetically. Priests are now no longer permitted to teach religion in the public schools.

This is indeed an indication of extreme animosity which will amount to a serious test of the faith of each true Catholic. What the slogan to happen is religious instruction to be banned completely from our schools, and is an anti-Christian philosophy to be forced upon our children.

Such enough information received here reveals the foreboding was more than justified. In a number of these public schools religious instruction has already been completely abolished. Parents remain of liberty to have religious instruction imparted to their children outside of regular school hours but it can readily be seen that this amounts to a serious handicap.

The Nazi policy is obviously springing in a direction where all Christian influence is to be eliminated from the public school system on the alleged ground that priests are "enemies of the State" and cannot be trusted to inculcate Nazi doctrines into the youthful minds.

POPE PIUS RETURNS TO VATICAN CITY

VATICAN CITY (AP Radio)—Until we meet again, if God wills.

This was the parting word of His Holiness Pope Pius XI as he departed from his summer home at Castelgandolfo, and returned to Vatican City Saturday.

Taking his leave of the personnel of the Papal villa His Holiness added:

"We are now on the last page of the calendar which is in the hands of God and therefore in good hands.

Then, having the great crowd that had assembled, he blessed all and remained some minutes returning air salutes with evident emotion.

At midday, the Papal automobile left Castelgandolfo, accompanied by four other cars containing his Holiness' suite. The cortege passed along the magnificent scenic way through the Via Appia to the banks of the Tiber. Arriving at Borgo, the Pope, for the first time since his new view offered of the Vatican Basilica since the demolition work nearby has so greatly improved it.

His Holiness car was stopped at the entrance of the large new avenue, which already has been christened Via Della Conciliazione (Street of Conciliation referring to the settlement of the "Roman Question"). The entire beautification project was explained in detail to the Holy Father, and he expressed deep satisfaction. He blessed the work, and after fifteen minutes returned the journey, re-entering Vatican City at 1 o'clock.

Begin Vaccination In Parish Schools

NEW ORLEANS The New Orleans Board of Health has begun a program in the white and Negro parochial schools in addition to the present system of vaccination and administration of toxoids.

Three doctors have been assigned to the new work as eye, ear, nose and throat specialist, an oculist and a general physician. Two sets of cards will be filled out, one for the board of health and one to be kept at the school. Parents will be notified of defects in their children's physical condition.

Bishop Hunt Elevated at Salt Lake

Twelfth Convert To Become Bishop; Sermon By Bishop Kearney

SALT LAKE CITY The Most Rev. Duane G. Hunt was solemnly consecrated the fifth Bishop of Salt Lake Thursday in the Cathedral of the Most Holy Trinity, the church where he worshipped as a layman. He was ordained to the priesthood, offered his first Mass and labored as a priest.

Attended by a score of Archbishops and Bishops, State and municipal officials, many Monsignori, and a large representation of the citizens of this city, the consecration was among the grandest and most impressive ceremonies ever witnessed in this section.

Among those in attendance was His Excellency, Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, who received Bishop Hunt into the Catholic Church when the latter was a student at the University of Chicago in 1913. Bishop Hunt is the twelfth convert to the Catholic Church to be elevated to episcopal dignity in the United States.

The Most Rev. John J. Mitty, Archbishop of San Francisco, was the consecrating prelate. The Most Rev. Robert J. Armstrong, Bishop of Sacramento, and the Most Rev. Thomas K. Corrigan, Bishop of Reno, were the co-consecrators. The Most Rev. James E. Kearney was Bishop Hunt's predecessor as Ordinary of the See of Salt Lake and who has been named Bishop of Rochester preached the sermon.

Bishop Kearney took as his text the words "As the Father has sent Me" the commission of Christ to the first Bishops. Emphasizing the importance of the episcopal office but also its tremendous responsibilities, Bishop Kearney asked his hearers to turn their attention from the brilliancy of the ceremony and to turn inwardly where Bishop Hunt has labored so long and where his preparation for the sacred office is about to assume.

Extensive Pastorage "Follow your prelate," Bishop Kearney said, "to an extensive pastorage covered with immense flocks, of which the guardians are comparatively few and the fences neglected, while the sheep are crowded into the enclosures, threatening to devour the tenderest lambs of the fold. You then hear him as he is called by the Supreme Shepherd who tells him that the sole care of his future life is to consist in feeding the flock in guarding it against the wolf, in repairing the broken fences, in reproving the negligent shepherds and if through his fault one of the flock were to fall in his care shall be demanded at his hands."

"Accompany him to an extensive district where the fields are already sown with a rich and abundant harvest, and taking as his text the motto that appears on his hand, telling him that in consequence of the season being far advanced, and the reapers few, he must toil with unremitting diligence and bear up against the heat of the sun and the weight of intense labor until the Master shall see every sheaf carefully deposited in the barn."

Hence my dear friends, Bishop Kearney added, on behalf of the new Bishop of this diocese, I appeal for your prayers as his former Bishop has co-worker, and his friend.

New Bishop's Motto Addressing his people following his installation, and taking as his text the motto that appears on his episcopal coat-of-arms, "Per Ecclesiam ad Deum," Bishop Hunt said, in part:

"It is scores of ways I remind myself of unfortunat limitations, in the light of which I might easily shrink from the responsibilities of the high office. But I realize though I may seem, God wishes to use me in spite of my limitations. He has chosen me I trustfully believe, for some particular purpose, the nature of which is yet to be disclosed. All the greater glory to Him therefore, if He can make out of me a life channel through which truth and grace and government may come to bless this people."

Pastor Sends Books To Mexican Seminary

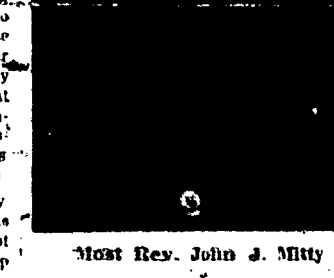

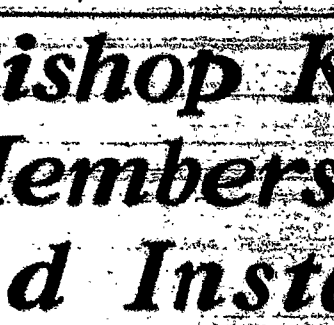

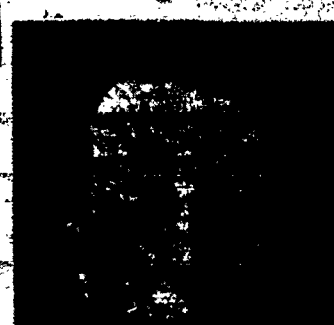
