An interdict against Santa Dominga Pueblo, with more than 1,000 Indian population, was lifted by the Most Rev. Rudolph A. Gaskin, Archbishop of Santa Fe.

Teachers employed by the religious sect, Jehovah's Witnesses, in carrying on attacks against the Catholic Church, brought arrest and fines for many of them throughout the United States and Canada.

The Very Rev. J. Hugh O'Donnell, C.S.C., was confirmed as president of the University of Notre Dame, the Rev. Charles C.
