Achievements of the Society of Jesus were praised in an Apostolic Letter which His Holiness Pope Pius XII addressed to the Very Rev. Vladimir Ledochowski, General of the Society, in commemorating its 400th anniversary.

Reviewing progressive steps taken by the Nazi government of Germany in gradually seeking to wipe out religious publications, The Tablet, London Catholic newspaper, declared: "It can now no longer be said that there exists in Germany a Catholic Press."

Knowing that resentment would be bitter if the people were denied the solace of religion in time of war, the Nazis avoided all semblance of anti-Christian activities. Yet they are carried on and it is generally believed that, in the event of a victorious ending of the war, the Nazis would wipe out the last vestige of religious observances.

Yachiro Suma, spokesman for the Japanese Government, declared in an interview in Tokio that there had been no attempt to eliminate foreign-born members of the Catholic hierarchy in Japan.

His Holiness Pope Pius XII appealed to his spiritual children throughout the world to join in prayer on Nov. 21 for all of those who have died as a result of the war, so that they may obtain eternal rest; that those who suffer or mourn may be comforted, and peace restored.

DECEMBER

Fourth General Meeting of the Catholic Biblical Association of America was held in Toronto August 27-28. The Rev. Dr. Edward J. Byrne of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester was elected President.

The National Foundation for American Youth, with Gene Tunney as temporary chairman, was formed as a pro-American organization to counteract the allegedly Communist American Youth Congress.

The Most Rev. Patrick Barry, Bishop of St. Augustine, Florida, died of heart failure in his 70th year.

The Rt. Rev. Mgr. Joseph P. Hurley, a priest of the diocese of Cleveland, was named by His Holiness Pope Pius XII to be Bishop of St. Augustine, Florida.

August Maffry of the Finance Division of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce announced that institutions in the United States made the following remittances to foreign countries during the past 21 years.

Protestant contributions: \$600,000,000, or half the total; Jewish groups, \$149,000,000, or 12 per cent; Catholic institutions, \$90,000,000, or 7 per cent.

The Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, retired Archbishop of San Francisco, a native Rochesterian, now living in Vatican City, observed his 80th birthday with a dinner at Hotel Majestic in Rome.

SEPTEMBER, 1910

President Roosevelt designated Sunday, Sept. 8, as a day of prayer in which the people of the United States were asked to join, "beseeching the Ruler of the Universe to bless our republic, to make us reverently grateful for our heritage and firm in its defense, and to grant to this land and to the troubled world a righteous, enduring peace."

Because Dr. Dexter M. Keezer, president of Reed College, was being considered for the presidency of the College of the City of New York, he asked that his candidacy be withdrawn.

OCTOBER, 1940 War Department officials announced that each Division Chaplain in the United States Army would be provided with a truck and trailer equipped for religious services. It was also announced that 275 additional Catholic Chaplains were wanted for active duty by April 1.

Only a common sense approach to self-protection in what is fast becoming a busy world, was the way the Most Rev. Edward J. Mooney, Archbishop of Detroit, characterized the vast national defense program of the United States.

Speaking at a K. of C. banquet, he said the United States must hold closely to a "highly cultivated sense of right and wrong" to avoid becoming a bully itself.

Catholics, "young or old, men or women," were asked to join or intensify their co-operation with the work of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine in an address by His Excellency, the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States. He was speaking at the sixth National Congress of the organization in Los Angeles.

The Most Rev. John T. McManis, Archbishop of Cincinnati, gave these essentials for national unity: Love of God, love of neighbor, strengthening of the American home, impress upon every citizen the need for upholding legitimate authority.

Emphasis to the importance and meaning of the Integral Missionary in the Church was given by the Most Rev. Samuel A. Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, in an address at the first National Integral Congress.

Today's duty of loyalty is to safeguard peace, shielded by preparedness and protected against enemies within our gates," the Most Rev. Joseph M. Corrigan, Rector of the Catholic University of America, declared at the convention of the National Council of Catholic Women in Detroit.

NOVEMBER, 1940 The number of priests serving with the United States Army was reported to be larger than at any time since the First World War, with 75 Catholic Chaplains in the Regular Army, Reserve Corps and National Guard, all on active duty.

Knights of Columbus Councils throughout the country, with many others, joined in prayer for peace on Armistice Day.

Development of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine has brought stability to the Catholic school population, despite losses in general school attendance, the Most Rev. Edwin V. O'Hara, Bishop of Kansas City, declared in an address at the regional conference of the Externity in Charleston, S. C.

Recommendation that Catholic school authorities continue their efforts to secure a "just share" of public funds for education was made at the annual meeting of the Department of Superintendents of the National Catholic Educational Association was made at its annual meeting in Washington.

Seven resolutions were passed at the National Convention of Catholic Women in Detroit, relating to peace, war, its victims and aftermaths. The effect of world conflict is felt throughout the world and the Council pledged anew their allegiance to pray for a better job.



Teachers' Convention at Aquinas Institute was opened with a Mass celebrated by Bishop Kearney and assisted by the Rev. John M. Duffy and the Rev. John H. O'Loane.

Stability of the Catholic School population in the United States despite the general losses in public schools was attributed to the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine according to the Most Rev. Edwin V. O'Hara, Bishop of Kansas City.

A just share of the funds spent by the government for education was sought at the meeting of the Superintendents of the National Catholic Educational Association held at Washington. The Rev. John M. Duffy of Rochester presided at the opening session.

A policy for safeguarding Catholic youths in national defense camps was sought at the meeting of the Bishops and Archbishops of the United States. Proper re-

ligious training with arrangements made for services was the main concern of the meeting. Msgr. J. Francis A. McIntyre, Chancellor of the Archbishop of New York has been named Titular Bishop of Cyrene and Auxiliarius of the Externity in Charleston, S. C.

Directly refuting the charge of prudence in the campaign for the cent literature, the Most Rev. John T. McManis, Archbishop of Cincinnati, declared the failure of being so worldly in Europe as examples of what can happen when religion is driven out and men no longer serve their God.

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt resigned from the American Rescue Ship Mission claiming that she was not influenced by alleged Communist control. When asked why she had resigned, she said she had resigned, she said she was doing a better job.
