The cost of living has jumped in that mission corner. Five years ago \$1.50 per month was sufficient to fill a mouth, now it is nearer \$5.00. Some of our communist brethren only know of the vast amount of unrecorded and privately known charity done by the Church, they would think things over.

**Desperate Fight**  
A late dispatch from Szechuan, China, reveals that eight American Sisters of Maryknoll continue to care for 200 insane women of the Shanghai Mental Hospital. The Sisters from the group states: "Things are rather trying now, you may well know it's a bomb here and a bomb there, and a question when it's our coming. We are working with a badly depleted staff. At the first sound of the plane many of our lay-assistants resigned. It is surely prayer that is keeping the bombs from our buildings."

A note received at Oosting, N. Y., in Motherhouse of the Maryknoll Order, reports their financial straits: "Can you send money for food? Loh bankrupt impossible to remove our patients. The Loh report is to Mr. Loh Pei Hong, a wealthy and extremely charitable Catholic Chinese who for years has supported this hospital for the insane. Since Mr. Loh's interests were in street railways, he is unable to do so. These sisters are from our own country. Certainly we can not turn a deaf ear to their plea. Any one who may be desirous of contributing to Loh's plea, can send their offering to the Diocesan office of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith."

**Nun Pleads  
For Aid in  
Fire Loss**  
Franciscan Mission in Jamaica Loses All, Sister From Here Writes

Total destruction by fire of mission buildings of Sisters of St. Francis in Jamaica has resulted in the sending of a stirring appeal by Sister M. Tarcisia, O.S.F., formerly of this city to friends in Rochester for aid.

In a letter to the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, diocesan director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith, Sister Tarcisia who was formerly Miss Agnes Scheid of 504 Magee Avenue, describes the extent of damage done.

**My dear Father Mooney:**  
Since you are acquainted with the work of our Sisters in Rochester, and are a friend of missionaries, I am writing this letter to you that our friends in Rochester may come to our assistance. Last Saturday a fire broke out near the convent and sparks carried by the wind ignited the convent buildings and completely destroyed the whole property. In that black night the convent there were four schools, a large chapel, dormitory building and laundry. All in ashes. None of the Sisters was injured so God's work can go on if our friends come to our assistance. We have nothing with which to start our work, but we feel confident that our friends will help us that we find courage to start from the bottom. The loss would be most disastrous for us to be forced to abandon the work which has been carried on for eighty years. Because of your kindness to me when I called to Jamaica, I feel sure that you will do your best to help us. God, who has been so good to us in our hour of trial, will bless you and all those who are so kind to us. Sincerely yours in Christ
