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YOUTH PROGRAM PLANS OF CENTRAL VEREIN OUTLINED

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., — The Rev. Edward A. Brummer, of this city, Vice-President of the Central Verein of America in charge of Youth, has issued a statement to members of the organization in which he outlines plans being made for the promotion of youth work.

Father Brummer states that a committee has been appointed to study a youth program adaptable to socialities or clubs. The study is being made of the program now in use in a certain parish which has Catholic Central Verein affiliation. He then describes this program which consists of a Junior Sodality with a monthly Communion Sunday, and secretaries appointed by the President to be in charge of various activities, and includes outings, parties, athletic and "recreation hours." The motto of the club is "Loyalty, Piety, Patriotism." Members wear an official button.

"We are well aware," Father Brummer says, "that this program will meet resistance in places where there are no socialities, for instance, a spiritual talk could be introduced into the Club Program. The program being flexible, can be made to include civic talks by State and patriotic representatives. In this program, too, the cooperation of parents is most essential, as nothing can take the place of home influence."

Their Problem too

"Our young folks should be taught to help along a little in the battle for social justice and for decent community conditions, and not be satisfied with leaving everything to the other fellow while their major interests remain centered in having a gay time. Ultimately their own family life will be greatly influenced by the economic and social conditions of the times." Youth Leadership and Catholic Action (N. C. W. C., Washington, D. C.)

ST. PATRICK'S GIRLS' HOME

The St. Patrick's Girls' Orphan Asylum Society was organized in 1834 by lay members of St. Patrick's Church. The Society purchased July 27 of that year a lot in the rear of the church property for the purpose of erecting an orphan's home. For several years thereafter no further action was taken. On January 7, 1839, the St. Patrick's Church Christmas collection amounting to \$114.94 was appropriated to the orphan's fund, to aid in erecting an orphan's home.

The trustees of the church were empowered by the congregation, January 3, 1841, to co-operate with the orphan society in selecting a site for the erection of a temporary orphan's home for the year the church as a gift contributed its Christmas collection to the orphan's fund. The society was also aided by liberal contributions from benevolent citizens and through that means was able to open the home July 5, 1842, under Miss Kelly as matron.

The original home provided accommodation for twenty-four orphans. In March, 1844, the society petitioned the Sisters of Charity of Emmettsburg, Maryland, to take charge of the orphan's home. That petition was granted the following year and guaranteed the future success of the institution.

Through special act of legislature, the home was incorporated May 14, 1845, under the name of the Roman Catholic Asylum Society of Rochester, with real and personal property specified as not to exceed the yearly value of \$40.00 per orphan over and above the value of the buildings occupied by them. By-laws were adopted July 13, 1845. The original Board of Trustees consisted of three priests and six laymen. Meetings were held monthly. Membership dues were a shilling per month with life memberships at \$30.00.

During the early years of the Home's existence subscriptions took the form of fees paid by members of the society, and of donations from charitable persons, but the main source of revenues was the annual fair on or near St. Patrick's Day. The Home changed its name from the Roman Catholic Orphan's Asylum to St. Patrick's Girls' Orphan Asylum May 24, 1887. During that year land was purchased in Clifton Street from the St. Mary's Boys' Orphan Home at a cost of \$3,000, and a new building was erected with funds supplied by the diocese. The new home had a capacity of 114 children. In 1909 a north wing was erected. This increased the home's capacity by forty-one. Sixteen quarantine beds and playrooms also were added.

This institution provides home care and education to Catholic girls from four to sixteen years who are full or half orphans, or children who through trouble or sickness are prevented from living at home. Board is charged at the rate of \$4.00 per week, but many are cared for for less and some without charge. Admission is made by direct application to the home, through the Rochester Catholic Charities and through commitment by for admission are referred to the Rochester Catholic Charities which makes a social investigation. The application is also passed upon by the Child Welfare Board. Each child is examined by one of the staff physicians before being admitted to the home and at least once each year thereafter. They are also weighed on frequent occasions.

Has Own School

This home conducts its own school. Kindergarten and grammar grades are taught; instruction is

Pastor Builds Church At Personal Expense

DUBLIN — A church to accommodate 800 people and dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary has been built at the personal expense of the parish priest, the Very Rev. Canon O'Sullivan, at Lanesville, Rathmore, Co. Kerry. The Bishop of Kerry, the Most Rev. Michael O'Brien, blessed and dedicated the church.

On the ground floor the layout is as follows: Office, two parlors, the chapel, guests' dining room, the assistant living room, the children's library, three playrooms, a locker room, three rooms for the staff and a bathroom and shower room for the aged children. On the second floor there are four class rooms, fifteen private bedrooms, a locker room for the large children, five bathrooms and a bathroom, a kitchen, a refrigerator room, three store rooms, a shower bathroom and the heating plant. A conservative estimate of the value placed on land and building is \$328,000 and on equipment \$28,000.

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
