Diocesan Social Agencies

ST. MARY'S BOYS' HOME

Before the St. Mary's boys' home was established, Catholic orphans were scattered throughout the diocese. In 1884, the Rev. Father Blady purchased a large brick building at No. 3 South Street, facing Washington Square, with money raised through public subscription. The home was opened November 1, 1884, with three sisters of St. Joseph's Asylum in Buffalo by Bishop Vincent G. Flanagan in charge. The first night the home was open, two little boys applied for admission and were taken in.

During the first year, between twenty and thirty boys were received from five to ten years of age. The new asylum was incorporated as the St. Mary's Boys' Orphan Asylum. At the end of the second year, the number cared for had increased to about seventy boys.

The present location, 117 North Street, was purchased, consisting of a large stone house with four and a half acres of land, including a garden and orchard. The house needed few alterations, affording large school rooms, well ventilated dormitories and recesses, a comfortable parlor and an attractive chapel. The home was moved to this location in the summer of 1891 and soon the number of boys had increased to 120.

The property was purchased at a cost of \$10,000 and was paid for within a few years. The state contributed \$500 in 1892. The central part of the present main building was erected. This building, with the old facilities, increased the capacity to 150 boys. In 1894, the old wing was erected. This addition included the new chapel. In that year also a resident chaplain was appointed. During 1896, the rear portion of the land consisting of one and one-third acres and fronting on Clifton Street was sold to the St. Vincent's Asylum. From this sale \$5,000 was realized. In 1909, the last of the original building (Hallway Hall) was torn down and the west wing was created. This addition increased the home's capacity to 200 boys and enlarged the chapel.

Scope of Work: This agency provides a home for Catholic boys from 4 to 14 years of age who are full of health and vigor. Each child is examined by a physician before being admitted. A charge of \$100 or \$200 per week is asked. Children are received through commitment from their parents or through application to the Rochester Catholic Charities, which makes a social investigation. The application is then referred to the Admission Committee for acceptance. Expenses are sometimes made to see requirements and as to the amount of charge to be paid for care. In some cases care is given without charge. In addition to providing home care, this agency conducts the boys' school, including kindergarten and all grammar grade subjects. Instruction is also given in manual and physical training and in vocal and instrumental music. Both day and evening classes are held. Library books are provided through the public circulating library. The home also has a large collection of its own books. Various Games: The boys of the home assist in the maintenance of the grounds of the home. They are weighed once a month and examined once each year by a physician and a mental hygienist. There is a large playground which has been divided into different sections for the children of different ages. Basketball and soccer are also played. There is a large collection of its own books.

PRAGUE—Sister Mary Christina, Czechoslovak nun who fled from Spain, is leaving for Argentina where she will teach in the Colegio del Sr. Coronado de Jesus, Hernando, Province of Cordoba. Sister Mary Christina witnessed the horrors of Spanish-Civil War. After her arrival here in March of this year, she delivered in all 110 lectures in various cities of the Republic on her dramatic escape from the territory held by rebel forces and her experiences in Spain. She lived for 30 years in the Trinity Order's convent at Valencia, Spain, where she taught drawing at the Teacher's Training College and Junior College in that city.

Marking Historical Catholic Sites

Other monuments of a similar character are contemplated in honor not only of the early Catholic pioneers, but also of those who built up our earliest parishes. The names of those heroes of bygone days should not be allowed to be brushed in oblivion but should be brought out into open records where they will be recalled to the mind of the average citizen. It is hoped that an insistence upon the lessons which a vivid memory of the past, revived by commemorative monuments, will make our citizens more grateful for the benefits derived from the pioneers and the subsequent promoters of religion in our region. The sites made sacred to posterity by the labors of our earliest Christian missionaries and their converts unfortunately remain unmarked for almost three centuries. A greater interest in the history of this part of New York State which should be promoted by the new guide books, which are being produced at public expense under Federal auspices, will it is hoped further the plan of marking all noteworthy sites of historical interest in our section of New York State.
