society and the Holy Name Society, both of St. Andrew's Church.

This branch also has associate members who pay one dollar a year in dues and are entitled to all the same privileges as the regular members.

The Central Verein has been active in the formation of credit unions throughout the country.

These credit unions did remarkably little service throughout the depression. The first credit union organized in New York State under the auspices of the Central Verein was that formed a few months ago in Holy Family Parish, this city.

Its organization was due in no small part to the splendid cooperation given by Rev. Joseph H. O'Neil, the pastor of the parish and a regular attendant at the monthly meetings of the Rochester branch.
