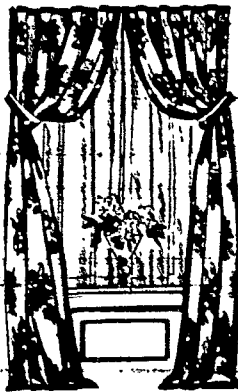

dent of the International Catholic Mass. Monsignor Flynn died in New York City, Dec. 29, 1936

December, 1936—Funeral services for the Rev. Samuel James Haughton, 48, who was stricken with a fatal heart attack while celebrating Midnight Mass in the chapel of St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell, with the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, officiating

December, 1936—Cornerstone of the new \$40,000 parish house of St. Joseph's Ukrainian Church was laid by the Rev. Basil Turula, pastor.

December, 1936—An invitation to join with the Holy Father in his Christmas prayer that "those who govern nations may see the light that radiates from the crib of the Saviour and seek the peace which the reign of justice He preached would surely bring," was extended by Archbishop Mooney in his Midnight Mass sermon at the Cathedral.

December, 1936—Through the generosity of some of the Catholic schools, churches and organizations, Catholic Charities were able to furnish Christmas dinners in their homes to 1,386 persons.

January, 1937—With distinguished prelates and laymen present from various parts of the United States and Alaska, solemn requiem Mass was celebrated coram episcopo for the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William J. Flynn, P.A., director of the Marquette League for Indian missions, at Sacred Heart Church here. Monsignor Flynn was nationally known for his work for Indian missions. He was born in Rochester. Archbishop Mooney presided at the throne during the funeral Mass with the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns celebrating the

January 1937—With a three-day celebration, St. John's Benevolent Society of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church celebrated the 25th anniversary of the society's founding.

January, 1937—New distinctly Catholic service prepared for induction of Catholic Scout troops was carried out in ceremony investing Boys' and Girls' Scout Troops of St. Stephen's parish in that Church in Geneva.

January 1937—Capacity audiences witnessed the showing of "Cloistered" the convent-life film at the Auditorium in Auburn.

January 1937—An announcement was made that the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen of Catholic University of America would accept a challenge, and answer eight questions put to him by Louis E. Budenz in the Daily Worker. Dr. Curran came out with his second article in the CATHOLIC COURIER's crusade against Communism. In his article Dr. Curran showed the necessity of Catholics taking an active interest in study of the Red menace.

January, 1937—Opposition to ratification of the so-called Child Labor Amendment to the Federal Constitution voted by members of the Rochester branches, Catholic Central Ver-ein of America and the National Catholic Women's Union at a joint session held in St. Joseph's Hall.

January, 1937—The Rev. William J. Kelley, O.M.I., director of the Catholic Action Club, Buffalo, opened the Rochester Council Knights of Columbus drive against Communism, Irreligion and Family Destroyers, with stirring address before 500 members in Columbus Civic Centre.

January, 1937—Altar Society of St. John's Church, Elmira, observed its 46th anniversary at a banquet.

January, 1937—Supreme Representative Joseph Tusaus launched the drive against Communism by Hornell Knights of Columbus.

January, 1937—Spring program announced by Confraternity of Christian Doctrine for study clubs of diocese. Subject selected was "The Life of Christ."
