April, 1937—Back from a tour which took them around the world and included visits at Catholic missions in Japan, China, Korea and India, the impressive ceremonies of the Eucharistic Congress in Manila and visits to the Holy Land and Vatican City came the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, managing editor, CATHOLIC COURIER, and diocesan director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith, and the Rev. John M. Duffy, superintendent, Catholic schools, Diocese of Rochester

April, 1937—Enroute to their mission in the heart of Africa, two Franciscan Sisters whose motherhouse is at Mill Hill, England, and whose mission station is situated among the lepers in Uganda on the Equator and in Eastern Central Africa visited the offices of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith

May, 1937—Catholic Daughters of Corning formed a Junior Court of the order with 40 new members

May, 1937—Dr. James D. McGill, president of the Board of Education, in a letter to the CATHOLIC COURIER said that Public School Superintendent James M. Spinning's recommendations calling for free bus service for only 37 parochial school children was "the fairest answer possible in view of all the circumstances"

May, 1937—Six Negro children ranging in age from seven to fourteen years received the Sacrament of Baptism at the hands of the Rev. George Weinmann, pastor of St. Francis Xavier Church and director of St. Peter Claver Society in a rare ceremony in the diocese held in Church of the Annunciation

May, 1937—Comprising the largest

class of its kind, close to 375 converts and other adults received the Sacrament of Confirmation from the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester, at St. Patrick's Cathedral

May, 1937—Three hundred and fifty persons attended the Mother's Day Communion Breakfast given by Cornell University Newman Club in Willard Straight Hall on the campus. The Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester, and Dr. Livingston Farrand, President of Cornell, were guest speakers. President Farrand was presented with a life-long membership in the Newman Club

May, 1937—Declaring there is slight variation between Communism as practiced in Russia and that which the Spanish people are now fighting in the Iberian peninsula, Clare Gerald Fenerty of Philadelphia, Pa., former congressman and former district attorney, told 300 men who gathered for the 50th anniversary banquet of the Holy Name Society of Holy Family Church at Osborne Hotel "for America and Americans there can be but one answer"

May, 1937—A new outdoor shrine of the Blessed Virgin was blessed by the Rev. John J. Baier, pastor at St. Theodore's Church, Spencerport Road

May, 1937—Following a protest by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John J. Lee, V.F. in the name of Elmita's Catholic clergy, "a less objectionable performance" was given by Sally Rand, dancer, in Keenev Theater in that city

May, 1937—Miss Marjorie L. Anderson, a senior at Nazareth Academy, won first prize in New York State in the Eighth Gorgas Essay Contest, it was announced at the headquarters of the Gorgas Memorial Institute in Washington

May, 1937—A challenge to the Rev. Michael O'Flanagan, scheduled to speak at Convention Hall, May 20, under the auspices of the Rochester Committee to Aid the Spanish Loyalists and to those sponsoring him to prove that he was not a suspended priest, was issued by the CATHOLIC COURIER

May, 1937—Winners in the Diocese of Rochester in the fourth National Essay Contest conducted under the auspices of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference, announced by the Rev. John M. Ball of Lima, diocesan director, National Catholic Rural Life Bureau were Robert E. Brantton, sophomore in Lima High School and Jeanett Schmits, aged 13 years, of St. Joseph's School, Wayland

May, 1937—Ground was broken on the property of Camp Stella Maris, diocesan boys' camp at Conesus Lake, for a new chapel to be erected in honor of St. Jude Thaddeus

May, 1937—A pageant, "The Wonders of 1937," commemorated the 25th anniversary of SS Peter and Paul's Church when staged by more than 500 school children in the school hall

May, 1937—Delving into the history of the public school system in America, the Rev. William J. Mahoney, C. M., J.C.D., M.A., of Rochester, stressed the value of parochial schools in an address before members of the Holy Name Society of St. Ann's Church, Hornell

May, 1937—The first Catholic Press meeting held in the United States in Cincinnati in 1890 was recalled by Willard A. Marakle, first editor of the Catholic Journal, fore-runner of the CATHOLIC COURIER in a special article written for (Continued on page 22)
