20TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION OF DRAMATIC CLUB

Twenty years spent in the capable presentation of plays were brought to an appropriate climax this evening in the 20th anniversary celebration which has just been concluded by the Dramatic Club of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church.

One feature was the production of "The Merry Widow" by the club under the direction of Fred Kraus and the following members in the cast: Florence Stumpf, Loreta Dittman, Dolores Annan, Agnes Markel, Elvise Dittman, Catherine Harman, Eleanor Bengt, Arthur Dittman, Fred Stumpf, Joseph Dittman, Joseph Hurley and Richard Meagher.

It was a success as expected. Celebration of the anniversary began with the lighting of the new altar. Then followed the 20th anniversary banquet was held at the Powers Hotel Ballroom on November 18, and on Sunday morning a Mass for thanksgiving in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help was celebrated.

During the year 1917, a number of young people of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, conceived the idea that there was a need for a dramatic club. They presented their idea to Father Meagher, who was at that time pastor, and he considered the plan a rather practical and good one, as he also wished to organize a form of club that would keep the younger members of the parish in close harmony with each other.

A play was selected and rehearsals were soon under way. The first play presented by the club was "The Merry Widow" on November 24 and 25, 1917. The play which was under the auspices of the Young Ladies' Sodality, was entitled "Our Vision" and was presented on December 12 and 13, 1917. Two performances were later given in June at Greece.

Encouraged by the unqualified approval which was evoked by their first dramatic attempt, the Dramatic Club entered upon an earnest and active participation in amateur theatricals. And from that time on, plays were presented, some in the winter and some in the summer. The peak of production was reached during the season 1922-23, when seven plays were produced. This season also marked an innovation in the type of play presented. "Up to the Year 1922, the club confined itself to the presentation of comedies and farces. But on February 26 and 27, 1922, the club produced its first drama entitled, "The Prince of Wales." This was soon followed by "The Friend of the Enemy," which was a stirring drama of the civil war days.

CHINESE SAVANT LAUDS INFLUENCE OF JESUITS

HONOLULU—China learned not only of Christianity but also of scientific, economic and other related subjects from the Jesuits," writes Dr. Shou-Yi Chen, professor of History in the National University of Peiping and visiting professor in Chinese History at the University of Hawaii, in his article, "The Early Jesuit Conception of Confucianism and its Repercussions in China," originally published in the Journal of Theological Studies (Kuo-Hsueh Chi-Kan) and recently abstracted for the China Institute Bulletin published by the China Institute in America.

In a tribute to the work of the Jesuits, the savant traces the introduction of western science and religion into China by the Jesuits during the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. He contends that the rationalist movement, the theory of enlightened despotism, and the economist and encyclopedist doctrines were, in turn, influenced to some extent by Chinese culture.
