It is a common sight to see

fuge outside his mission center.

ence in Cleveland last summer were
desirous of bringing Father Mc-
Clintock to Rochester. He finally
succeeded in paying a visit. He
has talked in the various Catho-
lic schools and colleges. He like-
wise attended the anti-Communist
meeting conducted by the
Knights of Columbus at the Col-
umbus Civic Centre Thursday eve-
ning.

Last Sunday evening many
Rochesterians attended a Mission
Picture Social which was con-

Munday, C.M. Father Munday, a
cousin of Anthony Cuhane, is sta-

na. He is a native of Philadelphia,

the Church which at present is
only a small chapel. Inasmuch as
his congregation has grown to the
sagging proportion of 1500 souls
his quarters are quite inadequate to
accommodate them. He is anxious
to lay the foundations of his new
church before leaving for Amer-
ica to celebrate his tenth anniver-
sary of ordination into the Holy
Priesthood.

Mr. Cuhane organized the social
as a means of raising a little fund
for Father Munday. The missioner
congratulated his truly apostolic
zeal, as likewise do we praise all
those who assisted in this mis-
sion venture.
