The newspaper is a very interesting one and it is a great asset to the college's library. It contains news and information from all over the world and is a very valuable resource for the students and faculty.

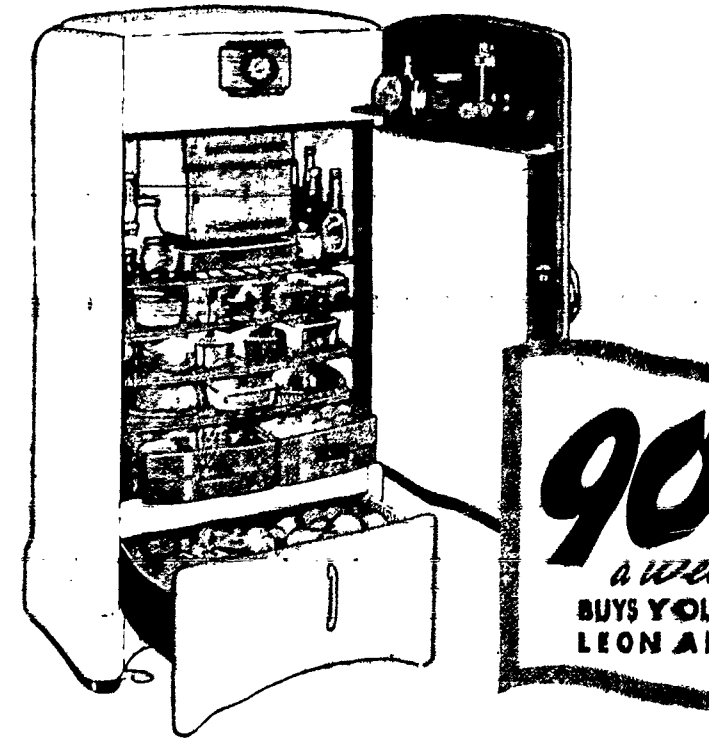
