Noted Chinese Savant Of Peking Catholic U. Offered Chair At Bonn

By N.C.W.C. NEWS SERVICE.—"HAGGARD" Word has been received at the National Office of the Catholic University of Peking here that Prof. Chang Han-tung, Head of the Department of History at the Catholic University of Peking, has been offered the Chair of History at Bonn University, Germany.

Professor Chang is admittedly the foremost authority on the history of the intercourse between his country and the West. His father, Chang Wei Hsi, former Professor of Geographic History at the Catholic University, was the founder of the Geographic Society of China, and for a long time Editor-in-Chief of the Chinese Geographic magazine "Ti Hsueh Tsa Chih."

Professor Chang took his Bachelor's degree in science at Harvard, studied later in Berlin, and was successively Dean of the Catholic University of Peking, and Editor of the magazine "Ti Hsueh Tsa Chih." Brother of Rochesterians Celebrates Silver Sacerdotal Jubilee in West

Observance by the Very Rev. W. J. Connaughton of his Silver Sacerdotal Jubilee in his church at Burke, South Dakota—marking the completion of twenty-five years in the priesthood—brings particular attention here.

Brother Connaughton is a brother of Lieutenant Emmet V. Connaughton of the Rochester Fire Department and Miss Laura Connaughton, 100 Front Avenue. His successful work has been followed with deep interest here.

Of the celebration the Burke Gazette reported: "The Very Reverend W. J. Connaughton of the local Catholic Church celebrated his Silver Sacerdotal Jubilee this morning when he acted as celebrant at St. Ignace's High Mass of Thanksgiving."

The sermon was preached by the Very Rev. J. G. Quinn of St. Peter's, P. O. Father Connaughton founded the Sacred Heart parish here over 30 years ago.

The parish choir rendered the liturgical parts of the Mass. The church was filled to overflowing with friends from many parts of the state as also from Chicago, Ill., and Rochester, N. Y.

Brother Connaughton has spent twenty-four years of his priestly life at Burke. Previous to coming to Burke he was assistant at St. Ignace and Chaplain of Hot Springs Soldiers Hospital.

Amongst the visiting clergy were Very Reverend Michael T. Costigan, Chancellor of the diocese and secretary to Bishop Lawler, who represented the Most Reverend Bishop, Reverend Austin H. Bonner of Clearfield, S. D., and Reverend Francis Penney of Newcastle, W. Va.

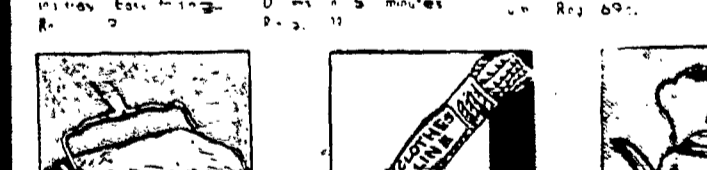

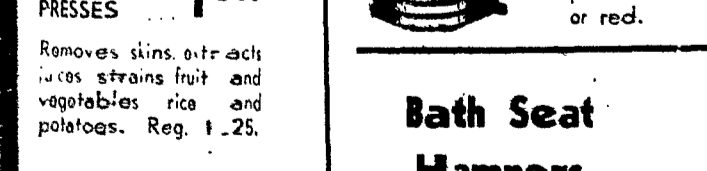

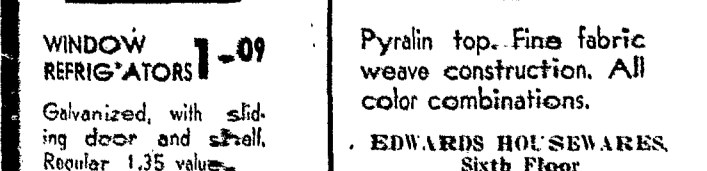
