Bishop Names Fr. Muckle To Lead Diocesan Pilgrims To Eucharistic Congress In Budapest; Outline of Complete Tour Given

The hope that the Diocese of Rochester will be represented by a delegation of pilgrims at the forthcoming Eucharistic Congress in Budapest in May was expressed by His Excellency, the Most Rev. James G. Kearney, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, in a letter to the clergy and laity, read in the churches Sunday.
Appointment of the Rev. John F. Muckle, pastor of St. Thomas Church, as Director of the Diocesan Pilgrimage was announced by the Bishop.
Father Muckle, who has been pastor of St. Thomas Church since its foundation, July 1, 1923, and is also vicar of the Priests' Eucharistic League, traveled extensively in Europe in 1928.
He will take a deep personal interest in every member of the pilgrimage and do his utmost to see that everyone in the party enjoys the journey.
Sail May 1
The Rochester Diocesan pilgrimage headed by Father Muckle will sail from New York on the S. S. Washington on May 4, arriving in Cobh, Ireland, May 10. They will motor through Ireland to Cork and thence to Dublin by afternoon rail to Killybegs.
After visits to Dublin the party will go to London where on May 14-16-17 they will visit Westminster Abbey and other points of interest.
Paris, Lieux, Switzerland and Vienna will be toured with the party arriving in Budapest, Hungary, on May 24 for the great religious spectacle and ceremonies of the Eucharistic Congress, opening on May 25 with arrival of the Cardinal Legate.
The pilgrims will witness and participate in the ceremonies, highlight of which will be the solemn procession of boats on the Danube with the Blessed Sacrament surrounded by high dignitaries of the Church escorted in a specially decorated ship.
In his letter directing attention to the Congress, addressed to the clergy and faithful of the diocese, Bishop Kearney states:
"In these days of strife and war, with the Faith suffering attack in many parts of the world a demonstration of devotion to our Eucharistic King by Catholics from all parts of the world is particularly timely. It is with this thought that I wish to direct your attention to the celebration of the 8th International Eucharistic Congress at Budapest, Hungary, May 25th to May 30th. To this historic and beautiful city on the banks of the Danube River, stronghold of Catholicism for centuries past, the religious of the world, numbering hundreds of thousands, will converge to rally round the International Throne of the Prince of Peace in the Sacrament of His Love."
