Wreck First Church On Mainland

Communists Ruin Vera Cruz Edifice, First Erected in America

MEXICO CITY (AP)—The Church of Christ in Vera Cruz, the first church built on the American mainland, is a mass of ruins.

Some years ago the Federal Government had turned over this historic and archeological relic of American Catholicism to the Government's department of "Monuments."

On Saturday morning the Communists entered the church and drove out the Catholics they found there, injuring some of them.

The Attorney General's Office has instructed the Federal Public Ministry to investigate the matter and Catholics are preparing a memorial to be sent to President Lazaro Cardenas.

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Regulate Dollar, Asks Fr. Coughlin

Declares Unregulated Money Cause of Today's Ills in Radio Talk

DETROIT (AP)—The unregulated dollar is the spearhead of social injustice, the Rev. Charles R. Coughlin pastor of the Shrine of the Little Flower at Royal Oak, declared Sunday in his radio address.

"Because I conceive this to be so," he added, "I earnestly advocate the adoption of a financial system in harmony with sound Americanism and Christianity which will operate through the agency of a regulated, honest dollar."

"All citizens are aware, the Constitution of the United States decrees that Congress has the right to coin money and regulate the value thereof and of foreign coins.

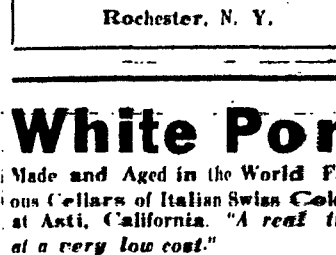
