'Snow White and Seven Dwarfs' on Screen at Palace

For years movie-goers the world over have been borne on the wings of fantasy by Walt Disney's animated characters for from eight to ten minutes at a time but now, in "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," his first full-length feature, they are enabled to forget the world of realism and revel in the beauties of an idealized drama for an hour and a quarter. This feature opens at the RKO Palace Theatre tonight at 8:00 p. m. with a reserved seat at 7:45. Regular performance will start Friday morning at 9:30 a. m. "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" is made in its entirety of drawings animated into living action, but the drawings are infinitely different from those of Disney's short length output. In the first place, with the exception of the seven funny little dwarfs, there is scant caricature in the picture. Snow White herself is a charming little lady and she has a charming singing voice with which to deliver four of the eight songs in the picture. Further, unlike the funny "Mickey" and "Silly" Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs has several emotional ingredients besides humor. These include high drama, pathos, excitement and suspense. There is an abundance of comedy, particularly in the scenes devoted to the dwarfs. Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs was in the mind of Walt Disney for more than three years, and the actual work on the picture in Technicolor covered nearly all of that time. But through the experience and added facilities gained in making this feature the producer is certain that the next full-length picture he makes he will be able to cut this period in half.

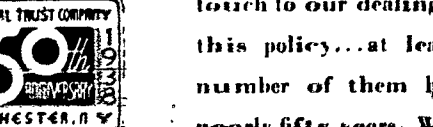
Hundreds View Prize-Winning Snapshots At Bank
