IN ONE WE ARE

A human being may be sick when he has spots in front of his eyes, but he isn't half as sick as old man Sol when he gets spots on his shining face. At a recent meeting of Broadcast Engineers in Columbus, Ohio, Dr. Dellinger, Chief of the Radio Section of the Bureau of Standards, revealed that an abnormal cycle of sun spots, which is expected to reach its peak in 1939, is causing erratic reception on the broadcast and will be an unusual weather over the entire country.

John Long, Technical Supervisor of WHAM, adds a local side to the report by explaining the why and wherefore of fading reported on WHAM's signal in recent weeks. Fading, he explained, is not a normal condition but a direct result of the sun's activity.

Speaking of sun-spots reminds us of the weather. The weather in turn reminds us of a story that came to light recently regarding the MacGregor Arctic Expedition. It seems that every one talks about the weather, even members of an arctic expedition. During a recent short wave broadcast from the expedition's site at Reindeer Point, Greenland, Clifford J. MacGregor, commander of the force, predicted a generally cold spring with more snow and ice for Canada and northeastern U. S. The Reindeer Point winter base is less than 600 miles from the North Pole.

Spring, aside from bringing new styles, will also offer some new programs. A group of old favorites will return to the airways on March 11 when the NBC-Blue network carries for the first time the new Royal Crown Revue featuring George Olsen's Orchestra, Glenn McNamee's Golden Gate Quartet, Uncle Happy and last but not least—the popular Tim and Irene. The program is slated for a Friday night spot 9:00 to 9:30 and will be titled "Music of Tomorrow."

America's Town Meeting of the Air, radio's greatest public forum, is accepted by listeners for many reasons. Most people listen to the Thursday night program because of the knowledge that may be obtained from its speakers. Others like the spirited debating that colors the broadcasts while a small group listens attentively with simple hope that a raucous rebel in the program will start a heckling campaign to "break down" a speaker. Town Meeting's worth was defined by NBC officials recently by a three year renewal of the broadcast contract. The new contract calls for an extension in the subject matter presented and the length of each yearly series. Also in the future Town Meetings will not only deal with political and economic problems but also social science literature and art.

Did you know that more than 1,000,000 Student's Notebooks have been distributed to school children throughout the country for use during the Music Appreciation Hour broadcasts of Dr. Walter Dill Scott? Stories of great American men and women are being told in many languages for radio listeners in South America and Europe in a series of programs recently inaugurated by WHAM, short wave station of the NBC International Division. Jack and Loretta Clemens, Buffalo stars who made good in the big city, are keeping music publishers busy. Recently off the press are their theme song "Speed" and Busy Making Love.

Beacon, flood lights and tower lights used to illuminate WHAM's 450 foot vertical antenna turn on each evening and off each morning without aid of a human hand. The trick lies in the fact that a small pilot electric bell is actuated by the amount of daylight falling upon its sensitized coil and switches are opened or closed as the occasion demands. Even in the event of a bad day-time thunder storm during the summer, the lights will go on automatically if the light of day fell below a pre-determined degree. Another ingenious device is the automatic system that warns the transmitter operator on duty in the event of a burr-in in the system. A meter at normal reading gives the total current being consumed by the flashing red beacon in the event that a bulb burns out, the total current reading falls and the operator instantly is aware of the condition. Duplicate bulbs in the Airways Beacon stop the steel spiral afford double protection in the event of a burr-out.

Must Keep Private Ownership

Fr. Coughlin Urges It Be Sustained But Warns of Wrong Idea

DETROIT (NC) — Declaring that private ownership should be sustained, the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, pastor of the Shrine of the Little Flower at Royal Oak, warned in his radio address Sunday against "an erroneous concept of the nature and obligation of private propertyship."

Order Insulted
"To my mind," Father Coughlin said, "order in itself is not the proper object of good government nor is it the chief characteristic of prosperity. There is order in the order—within the walls of Alcatraz prison."
