MISSION INTENTION: For the Seminary in China.
 Through a Fides release from Rome we learn that there are 1835 Chinese priests, while 983 young men are preparing for the priesthood in the major seminaries and 5992 in the minor seminaries. The future of the Catholic faith in China depends on a Native Clergy. Familiar with the language, accustomed to the ways and habits of their own people, Chinese priests are the Saviours of the country. The Holy Father calls for every Catholic a daily prayer for the Missions, and suggests for the month of March, the Seminary of China.

VENERABLE MARGUERITE BOURGEOIS

Marguerite Bourgeois was born April 12, 1620 in the farming town of Troyes, France. At the premature death of her mother she assumed the responsibility of her little family for early years. She was marked with prodigious signs of a religious vocation. Her application to the Poor Clares was rejected. Undaunted Mar-



guerite made a vow of perpetual chastity. Volunteers were being sought for New France, the present city of Montreal, called Ville Marie, had just been founded. Marguerite Bourgeois was among the volunteers. She offered to return and assume charge of educating the children in this distant land. It would be difficult to even imagine the hardships of that crossing. For 45 days they tossed about at the mercy of wind and wave. At a time when the term social service was unknown she performed this function in a most complete manner. The horns of the settlers were visited the sick ministered to, the poor clothed and the children of the colony taught.

With the population of Ville Marie steadily increasing, she was compelled to seek the aid of other friends with the same zeal as herself. Letters were sent to France appealing to the friends of her childhood to offer themselves to this truly apostolic work. Three former acquaintances answered the call and founded the nucleus of that wonderful community known as the Congregation of the Holy Name. Having seen her religious band firmly established and functioning with the same charity that dominated her every act, Marguerite Bourgeois was called to her Maker on January 12, 1720.

Today her 2200 daughters are arising on the soil of the beloved foundress, not only in the United States and Canada but in far off Japan and Korea. We of the Western Hemisphere who are so indebted to her indomitable faith, let us honor her memory by Christian charity of the European type, can continue their work in other nations with a membership in the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. We can do for others what has been done for us.
