Solemn Pontifical Mass to be celebrated by the Most Rev. James E. Kearney, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, in St. Patrick's Church, North Plymouth Avenue, near Brown Street, next Thursday at 10 a. m. will open the day's observance of the Feast of St. Patrick, great apostle of Ireland.

Irish-Americans and others devoted to St. Patrick will attend the Mass and will participate in other exercises scheduled in observance of the day.

The Rev. Vincent Dougherty, C. M., superior of the Vincentian Mission Band, Germantown, Pa., will deliver the pontifical oration.

Assisting the Bishop in the Mass will be the Rt. Rev. Mgr. William M. Hart, V. G., as assistant priest; Mgr. George V. Burns and the Rt. Rev. Mgr. William F. 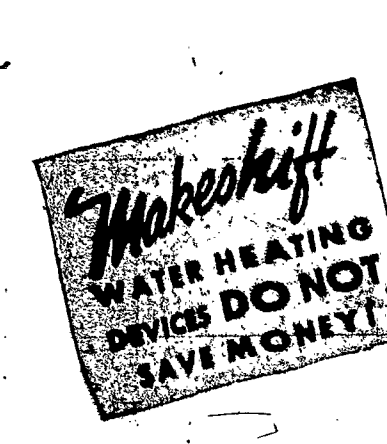
