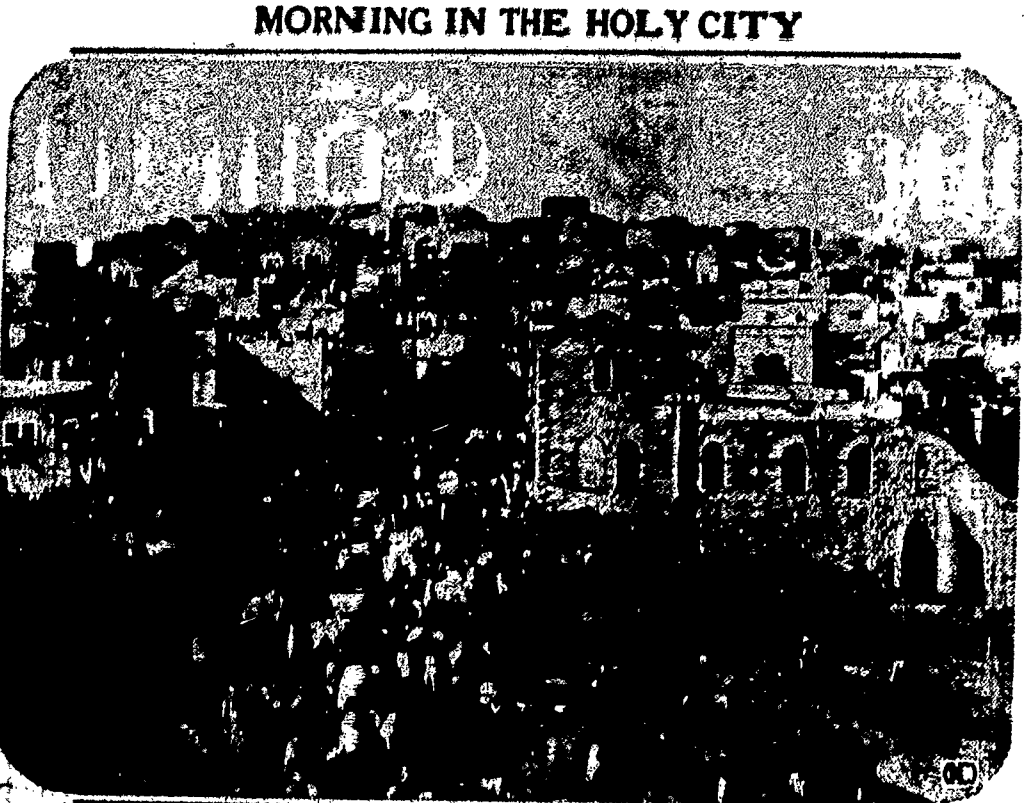

Scenes of Fervent Devotion Mark Centennial Rites in New Zealand

 AUCKLAND (N.Z.)—Approximately one quarter of the Catholic population of New Zealand made a pilgrimage to Auckland to participate in the first centennial celebration held in the Dominion. The first ceremony observed was that of the celebration of the Holy Sacrament of the Mass.

The celebrations were regarded as important by the Church community, was amply manifested by the presence of Archbishop O'Hara, Bishop of Auckland, and other bishops, along with the Archbishop of New Zealand, the American hierarchy and the Most Rev. Francis C. Kelly, Bishop of Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

The proceedings were marked by the enthusiasm of the laity. Thousands were unable to gain admission to some of the religious and civic functions.

New Zealand has been specially blessed by God throughout the past century. The Faith has prospered accordingly well since Jean Baptiste Pompallier, first Vicar-Apostolic of Western Oceania, celebrated the first recorded Holy Mass.

Accompanied by members of the Society of Mary, this missionary from France undertook a 14-month journey to bring the Faith to the Maori people and to administer the Sacraments to a handful of Irish Catholics in answer to the prayers and entreaties of Thomas Fitzroy, a humble settler and his wife, who hitherto, in their devotion to God, used to cross the Tasman Sea—1,300-mile journey—in a whale boat, to obtain the solemnities of baptism for each of their children, and to receive Holy Communion in Australia.

Pompallier and his Marist priests faced countless dangers and hardships in their service among the Maori (whites) and Maori, but the seeds they sowed fell in fertile ground, and the fruit of their labors is the flourishing and well-served Church in New Zealand today.

Honored by France, Long since entered into their heavenly reward, these pioneer French missionaries were posthumously honored by the Government of France at the centennial celebrations by the dispatch to Auckland of the cruiser, Jeanne d'Arc, the captains and men of which officially took part in several of the week's functions.

In the pride of their achievement, Catholic hearts were and during the centennial week that the Patriarch of New Zealand Catholicism, Archbishop Redwood, S.M., who, after having labored in the Pacific for more than 20 years, was called to reap his own harvest at the age of 94, had not been spared for another three years to take part in the remembrances of the men he had known in his youth.

The arrival of the "Wanganella" from Australia signified the commencement of the ceremonies. The liner bore 700 Catholics, led by the Apostolic Delegate, and including the Archbishop, eleven Bishops, a delegation of priests representative of numerous dioceses and religious

BIRTH CONTROL SURVEY CHALLENGED Magazine Sidelights In Answering

SOUTH ORANGE, N. J. (N.C.)—Asserting that two replies from an Editor of The Ladies Home Journal have evaded their challenge, the Catholic Daughters of America reiterate their protest that an article in the March issue of that magazine was "misleading, unrepresentative and unfair."

The article in question, purporting to reflect the opinions of the women of this country on birth control, asserted that "a majority even among the Catholic women 51 per cent declared their belief in some remedy without specification as to whether natural or artificial, for the problems which arise when children come too soon or too often, or into homes where poverty blocks their chances for health and happiness."

The C. D. of A. protest said statistical reference was made to approaching a very large number of women, but that the Catholic Daughters of America, an organization of 200,000 women, had never been approached.

Citra Surveys Made
 In response to a letter from Miss Mary C. Duffy, Supreme Regent, conveying the C. D. of A. protest, Bruce Gould, an editor of The Ladies Home Journal, directed attention to various publicizing organizations in the country, some of which, he said, have shown it possible "to accurately predict public opinion." He added that when that magazine decided "to take these surveys" it used six times as large a number of persons as experts were necessary to make the studies statistically correct.

In reply to this, Miss Duffy said the Catholic Daughters of America (Continued on Page 3)

 No one but his confessor was aware that he had been practicing such extraordinary forms of mortification. The deep callouses proved that he had worn these instruments of penance for many years.

Only a few days before his death, he said in his sermon to the members of the Young Ladies' Society: "Oh, how sweet it is to die at the feet of Mary! This desire was literally fulfilled for his life was snuffed out by the assassin's weapon directly in front of the Blessed Virgin's altar, now marked with a memorial tablet."

At the instance of Father Pignatelli, S.J., of Denver, who informed the former Bishop of Denver, the Most Rev. J. Henry Thien, of an alleged cure obtained through the intercession of Father Leo, the preliminary process was introduced with a view to his beatification.

Ecclesiastical courts were eventually held in the Archdiocese of Newark and in the dioceses of Denver and Ogdensburg. In January, 1933, nearly 26 years after Father Leo's death the sworn testimony gathered at these courts was formally sealed and dispatched to the Vatican.

The grave of the Servant of God in Paterson has become, it is said, the scene of not a few surprising favors or cures and other spiritual blessings credited to his power with God.
