IN ONE WE ARE

Very few industries adhere more closely to a pre-arranged schedule than does radio. Programs start on the second and go off the air on the second. If thirty seconds are lost during a program the show has to be cut while on the air or be run over a half minute into the following program. In the event that the following program were also commercial, difficulties would again develop due to the fact that the following program would start on the second and go off on the second.

NBC, usually held as a model of radio programming, has a rather unique method of solving the problem. Four electric master clocks, checked with U. S. Observatory time twice daily, keep 300 studio clocks accurately synchronized. To provide against cut-outs, each clock is equipped with two clocks, one on the studio itself and one in the control room, each depending upon a separate master-clock. If one happens out on this year, one circuit breaker stops stopping its master clock and the other circuit breaker keeps the clock going.

Except for approximately one half hour each year all 300 NBC clocks run on the ordinary 24-hour cycle of the city lighting current, but at midnight of the last Sunday in April NBC's own special 120 cycle generator speeds the whole system ahead an hour to bring its Daylight Saving Time. Getting back to Standard Time in October is easier. The electricians just stop the clocks for an hour.

Few radio entertainers in Radio City studios go on the air with greater ease than the four Negro boys of NBC's Golden Gate Quartet.

They can read music as they don't need it. They don't fuss with refinements of musical expression because, well, they don't need it. When they come to the mike for their spot on the Royal Crown Revue each Friday at nine o'clock, they are committed to memory to the words of their song. We get the melody and let the rest of it come natural. I just say hit it boys and we let our national instinct take care of the rest," explained Willie Johnson.

After hearing several of Dorothy Thompson's "People in the News" programs over WHAM, I couldn't help but wonder just where the exceptional commentator obtained her information. After a lot of hazy inquiries, the following story came to light. A large majority of Miss Thompson's material is obtained over her telephone. Her telephone is constantly busy. If it isn't, it's being used by Miss Thompson. It's hooked up with a call somewhere in the Orient. A girl named Dorothy Thompson has gathered first hand facts from the four corners of the globe for her programs. She travels with American ambassadors in East European countries, and she writes everywhere on the continent. She calls up her contacts in China as casually as you might telephone your neighbor. She asks questions and gives notes and from these materials she forms the basic material used on her programs.

For awhile Miss Thompson headed an American newspaper syndicate's Central European Bureau in Berlin. In 1932 she interviewed Hitler and wrote a book about it. It stirred such a storm that she was expelled from Germany after the Nazis came in to power.

New talent will be heard over the air Friday night April 15 at 7:30 on station WHAM when "The King and the Chorus Girl" is revived by the Wagner Brothers Academy Theater sponsored by the Grand Central Station Company. The production will be a new play, a comedy while two unknown youngsters take the leading parts. Susan Hayward plays the chorus girl and Bruce Lester plays the king.

NOTABLE JACOBITE LAYMAN EMBRACES Catholic Faith In India Rite

BRANFOLK, INDIA. (NC)—Rao Sahib P. K. Varughese, one of the most distinguished of Jacobite laymen, was received into the Catholic Church in St. Mary's Cathedral, Madras, at the conclusion of the Sixth National Eucharistic Congress in India. The Congress had been held at the great demonstration of faith that India has witnessed.

The Solemn Mass in the Synodical Cathedral, sung by Mgr. Ivanovic, was translated from the Malayalam into English by the Archbishop. It was newly reunited with Roman Catholics in an impressive manner of great dignity carried forward and knelt at a prie-dieu in the center of the sanctuary. In the presence of the Archbishop, Bishops and priests, he received in a simple but obviously moving way the words of the Profession of Faith.

The man was P. K. Varughese, upon whom the British Government conferred the title Bahib for his distinguished services as Chairman of the Branfokala Municipality. Once a leader of the Ernakulam Bar and a leading layman, Rao Sahib has very high connections in the Jacobite community.

Religious Present. Behind him, as he made his Profession of Faith, were his oldest son, a leading business man of Branfokala, and his son-in-law, Dr. V. V. Varughese, one of the most prominent advocates of the Madras High Court.

Rao Sahib Varughese appeared in many important cases in the Cochin Chief Court. He was the legal adviser of the Archdiocese of Branfokala and Verapoly and also was the chief of the lawyers retained by the Jacobite bishops. He came to study closely the claims of the Jacobites, and discovered for himself a lack of definiteness in teaching and organization, and also a want in discipline, all of which qualities he found in the Catholic Church.

As a result, he wrote down, 12 years ago, a declaration of faith in the Catholic Church. This he signed and backed up in a book, and he gave it publicly and to make his formal declaration when he had set his temporal affairs in order.

The reunion of Mar Severos with Rome fanned the smoldering ashes and Rao Sahib Varughese came to the office of the Malabar Mail, the Catholic daily paper, and met this correspondent. It happened that the Bishops of the Province of Ernakulam were holding their annual conference. A visit to the Bishops was suggested, and he came to the office of the Bishops for about a half-hour. The writer noticed Mr. Varughese kneel before each of the prelates and receive their blessings. Then he came to the writer and said:

"I thought I should immediately to the Malabar Mail for publication my declaration of faith."

The next day the Malabar Mail published the document, which was more than a formidable blow to the already battered Jacobite church. As Mr. Varughese himself said: "The Jacobites have been attributing unworthy motives to the conversion of their Bishops and priests to the Catholic Church. I should like to know what motive they are going to attribute to me." In fact, they had no ulterior motives to attribute to Rao Sahib Varughese. Here, in the case of a rich man of great ability and talents, possessing the power to do good, the Jacobites could do nothing but admit a clear case of conversion by conviction.

Birth Curb Survey

BISHOP CONFIRMS AT NAVAL POST

30 U. S. SAILORS ARE CONFIRMED By Bishop Keough At Navy Station

NEWPORT, R. I.—The Most Rev. Francis J. Keough, Bishop of Providence, celebrated a Solemn Pontifical Military Mass and administered the Sacrament of confirmation at the Naval Training Station here, Sunday. It is believed to be the first time that these ceremonies have ever been held there.

Bishop Keough confirmed 30 sailors from Fort Adams, and four children of naval families following the Mass. Six hundred sailors and almost as many other persons, including the wives and families of officers and enlisted men, filled the chapel.

Military features connected with the ceremony were directed by Commander J. R. Barry, senior officer of the station, Commander Barry and Captain L. F. Welch, who succeeds him in command in May, and on the right and left of Bishop Keough at a breakfast following the Mass. When Bishop Keough administered confirmation, Captain J. A. Mahoney, U.S.N. of the Training Station, Commander Gordon Hultine, U.S.N. of the Naval War College, Commander J. A. Welch, U.S.N. of the Training Station, and Major Harold Brooks, U.S.A. of Fort Adams were among those serving as sponsors.

"You have received confirmation that you might be made strong and perfect Christians and soldiers following the Mass," Bishop Keough told the members of the class. "This is not to be construed in any way as a divided allegiance for you have as well all the honor and glory of being sailors of the United States Navy."

"You, the sailors and the soldier, to adopt the Blessed Mother of their patroness for qualities of humility, obedience and purity, Bishop Keough urged them to "march with Our Blessed Mother by your eternal reward."

"Do the Lord and the navy that do no like a traitor," Bishop Keough continued. "It is the same with Almighty God. I do not feel ashamed of your faith or turn your back on duty. Do not be proud of your Catholic faith and let other three deny it. You will be better servants of the government and defenders of our country's shores when you are good loyal faithful Catholics."

U. S. Networks To Carry Pope's Easter Broadcast

WASHINGTON.—The annual Easter Sunday message of His Holiness Pope Pius XI will be heard throughout the United States over stations of the Columbia Broadcasting System and the radio network of the National Broadcasting Company April 17 from 8 to approximately 8:30 a. m. (Station WHAM of Rochester will carry the NBC broadcast.) Columbia officials also announce they have arranged their Easter morning schedule to accommodate the Pope should the program run more than half an hour. Translation will be broadcast immediately after the Pontiff's talk.

Easter music by the Choir of the Shrine Chapel and the Benediction Choir will be heard direct from the Vatican. It will be the tenth time His Holiness has been heard in the United States over the CBS network. This will be the Pope's third Easter broadcast.

TALKS ON 'CHASTITY' By Dr. Kirsch Listed For 'Catholic Hour'

WASHINGTON.—A series of addresses entitled "In Defense of Chastity," by the Rev. Dr. Felix Kirsch, O. M. C., will be given on the program of the nation-wide "Catholic Hour" from Sunday, May 1, to Sunday, June 5. It has been announced by the National Council of Catholic Men, which produces the "Hour." The "Catholic Hour" is presented over the National Broadcasting Company network Sundays at 5 p. m. EST.

On Sunday, April 24, a special low Sunday musical program will be broadcast, featuring the Paulist chorists and a symphony orchestra. There will be no speaker. Titles of Dr. Kirsch's six addresses are "What is Chastity?" "The Clean of Heart," "Purity of Speech," "Aids to Chastity," "The Building of Character," and "The Christian Home." Dr. Kirsch is the author of a number of books on Catholic faith and practice. His "Sex Education and Training in Chastity" is one of the most authoritative works in the field.
