Quick Action On Social Problem Urged by Priest

Warning that no one knows what the next six months will bring, the Rev. Raymond A. McGowan, assistant director of the N.C.W.C. Social Action Department called on all Catholics to do their part to bring about a quick change in the social structure of the nation in a lecture Sunday evening at Columbus Civic Center.
 Presented by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, Father McGowan spoke to a large audience under the auspices of the Catholic Workers' Club. Seated with the Bishop and Father McGowan on the stage was the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William F. Borgan, Chancellor of the diocese.
 Social Justice Aim
 His Catholic principles, Father McGowan pointed the way for a better understanding between capital and labor and for a more cooperative spirit to result in true social justice.
 He proposed that the federal government call together all organized employers and unions in every major industry and lead them in working out those wages and prices that will pay an adequate living wage. He opposed the theory that new employment can only come from new investment.
 Based on facts in his possession, Father McGowan contended that "new purchasing power has been and is being by the return of business and voluntarily to pay better wages and salaries and the failure of people to force them through unions and legislation to do this thing that they have not wanted to do.
Purchasing Power Need
 By this time we should know that the unemployment is no passing fever but the sign of a deep-seated disease in spite of that, leading newspapers and many commentators are insisting that new employment can come only from new investment and that new investment is halted by the fear that the returns will not be large.
 "The very opposite is true all along the line. New employment can come only from new purchasing power. We can produce so much more goods now than we ever could, and with less manpower, that if we do not get wide purchasing power among those actually at work, we will have unemployment permanently on our hands."
 "Maybe the business community is not ready yet for thorough-going action. Maybe it is still convinced that it can get along although facing a balance of trade deficit. Have in mind government leadership in the purchase of goods for the people of work in the industry and for the consumers. And a quick success can have the states do the same for intrastate industries and services of all sorts.
 "More unionism and collective bargaining is necessary. But unless unions reach the prices to set up a balance in all prices for some time too high and some are too low and work for the common good more collective bargaining ends in disorder or defeat. To keep wages up is not enough."

BISHOP KEARNEY Concludes Lenten Services in Geneva

GENEVA—The concluding sermon of the Lenten services at St. Francis DeSales Church was preached by the Rev. James E. Kearney, Bishop of Rochester, on Monday evening, April 11.
 In this his first official visit to Geneva, Bishop Kearney expressed his pleasure in first appearing at a religious service in Geneva rather than at a social or civic occasion and pointed out the appropriateness of the season, so near at hand, choosing as his theme the institution of the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist and the foundation of our Faith.
 The services, largely attended, were concluded with solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament by Bishop Kearney.
