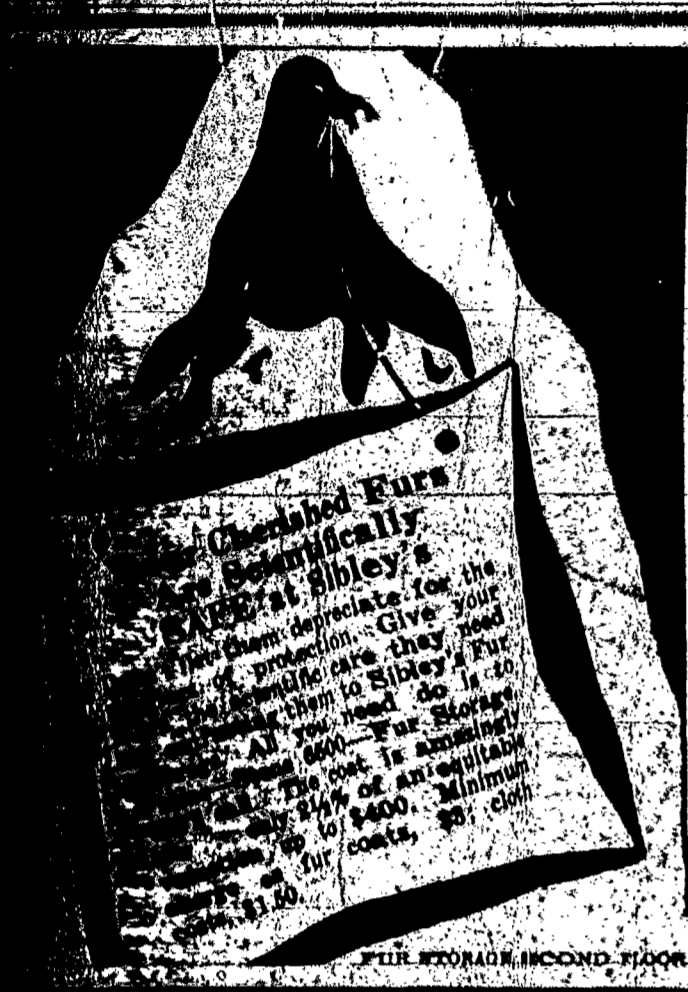

DIAMOND JUBILEE OF ORPHAN SOCIETY Noted at Mass in St. Joseph's Church

Organized with the one thought, the practice of charity, the St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum Society has, during its 75 years of existence, faithfully carried out that tradition. Thus was the society commended as were the Sisters of Notre Dame in charge of the St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, by the Rev. John C. Behr, C.S.S.R., former rector of St. Joseph's Church in his sermon at a solemn High Mass marking the society's 75th anniversary, in St. Joseph's Church, Sunday.

The Diamond Jubilee Mass attended by officers and members of the Board of Trustees of the Asylum was celebrated by the Rev. Frederick Marasky, C.S.R., pastor of St. Joseph's and President and Treasurer of the society, assisted by the Rev. Charles Marasky, C.S.R., a graduate of the Asylum and the Rev. Gerard Kuhn, C.S.B., R. Father Kuhn, in his sermon used as his theme Christ's words: "But for Little Children to Come Unto Me, for Such is the Kingdom of Heaven."

The Board was guest of the Sisters of Notre Dame at the Asylum following the Mass.

Following the Mass, the Rev. Marasky spoke reminiscences of his days at St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, and said that if it had not been for the training he received at the home he may never have completed his education. He is now assigned to the Mission House with headquarters at St. Basil's Church, Philadelphia.

St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum was established in 1863 and on April 27, 1938, the Society's 75th anniversary. The society was incorporated by a special act of the State Legislature.

The orphanage received Catholic children of any nationality. The number of children have been about 250 since its establishment 75 years ago (late 1863).

At present there are 11 children who will be transferred to St. Patrick's Girls' Home and St. Mary's Boys' Home after the school year in June, when the present building will be used for other parish purposes.

Besides Father Nattinger, the President and Treasurer, other officers are Vice-President Charles L. Gerhart and Secretary Henry W. Besman. Members of the Board of Trustees are William J. Hauser, Frank Gots, Gustave Klutz, William J. Malaninski, Seraphim Schwartz and Fred J. Hineser.

The laymen are sons of the original incorporators of the society.

GENEVA - The St. Stephen's Club's delegates to the Geneva Traffic Safety Council have prepared a window display in connection with the Traffic Safety Rally which was held at Geneva High School Auditorium on Tuesday evening under the direction of Police Chief R. W. Morris.

Dr. Herbert Steak, National Subjunctive Director of the Conservation Department, was the featured speaker at Tuesday night's rally.

The window display, which was placed in the Geneva Dry Cleaning Company on Linden St., represented the scene of an accident with toy stunts and exhibits with tentacles, together with an array of pamphlets and posters on the subject of traffic safety.

Reds Dupe U. S. Clergy, Sedgwick Charges

Reds Dupe Clergy Sedgwick Charges

Editor of one of America's most respected literary journals, Sedgwick said the Protestant Episcopal Church had too many leaders becoming "mass-minded." He said: "Perhaps it means the Protestant Episcopal Church is sensitive to its reputation for wealth and social position and seeking a larger share of proletarian support.

"But it doesn't seem possible. We have many Protestant clergymen talking to Communist organizations and supporting organizations obviously Red.

"If only the Protestant clergy had a little more imagination! If they would get themselves in the places of their Catholic brethren: Protestant churches were burned, Protestant graveyards dug up, Protestant priests beaten before their altars, the sacred element of the Protestant communion swept from the table, then how different would the Catholic brethren be? Protestants are in the safety of their own country, criticize the Spanish Catholics who cry out in agony!"

"Saw Loyalist Bombing"
 The Loyalist Reds were "far worse" than Fascist Whites in the early days of the Spanish conflict, Sedgwick stated.

"I saw a country church in insurgent territory, far from troops or munition stores, bombed without warning by Loyalist planes. At least 100 women and children were in the church, which were killed or horribly mutilated." Sedgwick said he knew for a fact many of the "Marxian dupes" are won by sentimentalism, such as atrociously photographs allegedly showing the brutality of Franco against Spanish Communists.

"God knows," he said, there have been cruelties enough practiced by both sides.

"Sedgwick admitted he was "much concerned" over the attitude of certain Protestants talking about Christ and more about right and left.

"It is a pretty state of affairs," he continued, "when they forget that the clash in Europe today, which is not between a right and left but between Christianity and Paganism between civilization as we know it and Communism.

"It behooves clear-thinking American Protestants to wake up to the fragmenting spectacle of clergymen rubbing elbows with intellectual Communists, they are opening the ranks to Marxism.

"If they are Communist they had best say so in the pulpit."

He added that the clergy conflict between Fascism and Communism would be ended if the latter was wiped out.

"Fascism is born of the fear of Communism. If the communists and Fascism will fall out."

"Two of the 61 Bishops whose signatures were on the open letter answered by Mr Sedgwick have since asked to have their names taken off."

CARDINAL NAMES State Chaplain For C. D. of A.

His Eminence, Patrick Cardinal Hayes, has announced the appointment of The Rev. Patrick O'Donnell, Pastor of the Church of St. Gregory the Great in New York as New York State Chaplain of the Catholic Daughters of America. Father O'Donnell occupies a position of prestige in the New York Archdiocese. As State Chaplain of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, it is his function to assure the best interests of a large group of Catholic men in the New York Archdiocese. Now as State Chaplain of the Catholic Daughters, it falls to his lot to act as spiritual advisor to one of the strongest and most influential Catholic women groups in the state.

The newly appointed State Chaplain is a native Irishman, born in County Waterford, Lisnara, Ireland; he received his early education there, where his elementary training was completed. He matriculated at St. John's College, Waterford, and from there to the College of St. Mary.

The next five years were spent at the College of Maynooth, where he received the first degrees ever presented by that famed institution, Doctor of Canon Law and Doctor of Divinity.

Father O'Donnell was ordained at studies at London University upon Maynooth in 1901 and continued his education in the United States where he was appointed curate at the Church of the Holy Innocents, West 3rd Street, and from there he was assigned to the Church of St. Francis de Sales Manhattan. After further studies at the Graduate School of Columbia University, receiving Master of Arts and at the New York University, Doctor of Philosophy, Father O'Donnell was appointed pastor of the United parishes of Tompkins Cove and Grassy Point.
