Thomas E. Bielek of Geneva told of the success of the Novena to St. Thomas More, Edmund B. Macleary of Elmira reported on Holy Name participation in an address given by the Rev. Ignatius X. Cox of Fordham to answer a birth control advocate.

George Cuddy of Auburn reported on what is being done in that city to stop the sale of obscene literature and Lewis E. Schur, diocesan union secretary reported on the wide activities in Rochester.

The Union approved a recommendation to the National Officers of the Holy Name Society that establishment of a Catholic daily newspaper be supported by the Holy Name Society of the country be advanced.

The convention unanimously voted to elect former County Judge Philip H. Donnelly as executive vice-president, a new creation by a change in the constitution. All other officers held over. Father Stauffer in moving the election said it was in recognition of the fine work done by Judge Donnelly for the Holy Name Society.

The Rev. John J. Healy was named spiritual director of the Auburn diocese and the Rev. William J. O'Brien of the Geneva diocese to all vacancies.
